

JOURNAL PICTURE RECALLS STORIES OF TERRIBLE FIGHTING.

March to the Front. The regiment constituted part of the independent brigade that had to the headquarters of supplies at City Point.

Belonged to the First. D. L. Morgan, past commander of the department of Vermont, served with the First Minnesota after it had been recruited and saw active service with the regiment before Petersburg.
