Nearby Defeats Herrera in Seventh Round at the Milwaukee Show.

Milwaukee, Aug. 18.—Charles Neary, Milwaukee defeated Aurelio Herrera of Bakersfield, Cal., in the seventh round of an eight-round bout before the Badger Athletic club last night.

Herrera's second hit the sponge into the ring after Neary had forced his man in the first minute of the seventh round, when it was apparent the Mexican could not rise to his feet before the count of ten.

It was Neary's fight from start to finish. The Mexican was scored one in the first and five times in the second round, and was saved from a knockout by the bell. Herrera stalled thru the third round, taking considerable punishment. It was scored for the count of nine in the fourth and stalling still saved him from a knockout.

Herrera seemed to get strong in the fifth and staggered Neary with a terrific right to the jaw, but the Milwaukee boy soon recovered. The Mexican was again scored in part of the sixth, but toward the end of the round Neary had him reeling like a drunken man.

Neary was more determined in the seventh, and after one minute of fierce fighting handed a right jolt to the jaw that forced the Mexican, and his seconds threw up the sponge.
