

WIRELESS TO AID RUSSIAN REBELS

Leaders Find New Way to Conduct War On Czar.

Copyright, 1906, by the Press Publishing Company. St. Petersburg, Aug. 18.—Your correspondent with the revolutionists has been made aware that the fires not only are still smoldering, but they are about to break into flame with greater ferocity than before.

The authorities will discover, it is predicted, that the subduing of the revolutionary movement will be a task of stupendous magnitude. It is being directed chiefly from Finland, the asylum of all kinds of political fugitives and expatriated revolutionists.

The Finnish rendezvous is the headquarters of a perfect system. Secret meetings are held and agents are detailed to visit other parts of Russia to carry out carefully prepared plans.

Troops Are Massed. These embrace the establishing of a system of wireless telegraphy to maintain communication between revolutionary leaders posted in different centers.

Arms have been distributed plentifully through Finland, and the troops are being flooded with troops. The forests are filled with fugitives.

PEASANTS READY TO RISE. Millions of Oppressed Slavs Rise for Rebellion Against Czar.

London, Aug. 18.—The condition of affairs in Russia is becoming more and more uncertain. The cloud of uncertainty that has hung over the eastern horizon for months has not been lifted.

Russian bonds were boomed during the first half of the week, but the strength of St. Petersburg dispatches indicating that Stolypin was negotiating with certain liberal leaders of moderate stripe.
