NEW BUILDING WILL BE READY BY OCT. 1.

Wives and Widows of Departments May Enjoy Comforts of Institution—Officers Report Year on Hand After All Bills for Year Are Paid—Some Home Figures.

Oct. 1 is the date set for the opening of the Minnesota Soldiers' home to the wives and widows of veterans of the civil war. By that date the old people's building will be ready for occupancy.

Rules for admission to the home and for its conduct will be drawn by a committee from the board of trustees, which met yesterday to consider plans for the new building and the regular business of the home.

FINDS MINNEAPOLIS GOVERNOR SENDS A FEW FIGURES

WORTH \$171,669,655 CITY ASSESSOR MINOR FOOTS UP THE VALUATIONS

Present Rates in Minnesota Are Compared with Those of the Iowa Distance Tariff—Governor Also Turns Over Attorney General's Opinion Declaring Elective Commission Valid.

Minnesota is worth only \$171,669,655 as appraised by City Assessor C. J. Minor. This sum, appearing large, is only a small portion of the actual wealth of the city for three reasons.

The assessor's valuation is based on 50 per cent of its real value; because a great deal of personal property is concealed from the assessor; and because millions and millions of public, railroad, church and charitable property is exempt from taxation and does not appear in the assessor's figures.

The assessor's valuation is an increase of \$88,000,000 over that of last year. Some of the increase is due to a general advance in real estate over the values of two years ago; some of it is due to the new feature of assessing foreign corporations for a portion of their capital stock, and some to an assessment for "credits," which is an item that represents but is not classified under bank stock, bonds, and shares in foreign and domestic corporations.

The Item of Credits. This single item of "credits" makes a total of nearly \$9,000,000 and is by far the largest item in the personal property column. The whole stocks of the city are but a little over half the amount, and the wholesale and retail stocks together do not equal the one item of credits.

Oh! The Planos. The valuation of household goods aggregated \$4,000,000, exclusive of 12,873 pianos, \$70 organs, a lot of clocks and plated ware. Of horses and mules over three years old there are 9,007, and of cows there are 1,964, and of calves, which are owned in the twelfth ward.

Not Many Hogs Listed. Minneapolis is not strong in sheep or hogs, but there are 375, a gain of eight over last year. In the last year 115 were admitted and 68 were readmitted.

By far the richest ward in the city is the fourth. With its big retail and wholesale houses, its large financial corporations, the headquarters of the public service corporations and the greater part of the most valuable real estate in the city, it shows a total of close to \$60,000,000, or about one-third of the entire value of the city.

Underwriters' Address. The Minnesota Life Underwriters' association believes that your recommendations will be a potent factor in forming public sentiment concerning life insurance interests and in shaping life insurance legislation in the near future.

Second the most thorough publicity of all the material methods and results of management, together with our expenses, laws, will accomplish all that your committee wishes to effect. These five requirements are:

First—A strict annual accounting of all surplus of dividends, all such funds to be carried as separate liability funds. It is unnecessary and therefore unwise to say by statute when surplus should be paid, but it is a proper basis for private contract so long as ownership of such funds is definitely vested in the insured.
