Art Aids for Busy People

AS EARLY as 1844 a wealthy and distinguished English physician called one morning in Florence upon the sculptor Phiram Powers. He was accompanied by his son, a handsome, restless boy of 14, carrying a huge portfolio, whose eager face and excited manner showed how much depended upon the great man's verdict that was to prove decisive in the boy's future career.

The sculptor slowly and carefully examined the work placed before him—drawings, sketchbooks, studies in color and more finished cartoons. Breathlessly, without daring to speak, Frederic Leighton watched the examiner's countenance as he silently studied the work, and at last his father asked, "Shall I make him a painter?" Powers replied: "Sir, you cannot help your own nature in the career which he is ready to let him aim at the highest, he will be certain to get there," was the concluding remark in this conference, which settled the career of this versatile artist, who received, among many honors, the recognition of his contemporaries in being elected the president of the Royal Academy for the last eighteen years of his life. He died in 1895.

How He Was Influenced

Many factors contributed to his success. His father gave him the most thorough instruction in astronomy, which was the basis of his spirited sketches in his early life, and a most important drill in the fundamental principle of drawing, which many artists obtain after years of struggle, and then only to find that the study of the sciences of the earth and the heavens, which the family to spend years on the continent, in different foreign cities, particularly favorable for art study under the best instruction in London, where his scenery was inspiring and with the most cultured society. In Switzerland he gathered flowers from the grassy slopes of the Alps, while studying the classics in Rome he was studying the fascinating relics of the past, or later, in company with Robert Browning he drank in the poetic charm of the stately Coliseum's ruins. In the atmosphere of Florentine art, instructed at the academy, he painted "Cimabue Finding Giotto Tending His Giotto to the Vatican," the famous pupil of Cimabue, who was called the "Father of Italian painting," we can understand Leighton's inspiration in his early pictures, which was purchased by Queen Victoria, called "The Madonna of Cimabue Carried in Triumph Thru the Streets of Florence." This first great picture forms an epoch in his career. He studied for a year in the Staelde institute, Frankfurt, under Steiner, who, although somewhat stern, was exactly adapted to train the eccentricities of genius and dangers of overpraise.

From Frankfurt he made many excursions, sketching castle ruins. An illustration of his lovable nature and fondness for children is shown, when on one of these excursions he was sketching a quaint peasant woman, and while she was resting as a model, he held her baby, admiring its chubby feet.

He studied at Berlin, Dresden and Brussels, familiarizing himself with the works of the great masters in the galleries, and absorbing from such men as Overbeck, Cornelius, Schnorr and Pfriem their elevated thoughts and lofty ideals. It is true of all Leighton's work he never painted anything of degraded or low suggestiveness. His latest studies were in the French studios of Decamps and Scheffer.

His Travels.

Speaking many languages fluently and his extensive travels especially valuable. Always working industriously, he gained thoughts for classic subjects on the Nile, where he accompanied the famous engineer, M. de Lesseps; he was charmed by Andalusian scenes and Moorish architecture in Spain; he secured the theme for his

many scriptural subjects in Palestine, as "The Jews' Quarter in Old Damascus," "Elijah in the Desert," "St. Jerome," "Rissak" and his famous "The Sea Giving Up Its Dead," designed for St. Paul's cathedral. His sketches have the wide range from the dreary bogs of Ireland to the brilliant coloring of Persia and the orient.

His Classical Pictures.

The most important themes of this most typical representative of academic work were taken from Greece, not only from great examples sought during the happy days at Athens and Thebes, but those in the British museum, the "Elgin Marbles," accessible to all, and from which he worked after remaining more permanently in London. His portrait, self-painted, in the Uffizi, has as a background the frieze of the Parthenon. In his "Dedalus and Icarus," the latter might stand for another Apollonian Belvedere, in the splendid proportions of typical youth. "Helios and Rhodios" is an idyl of the gods. The "Daphnephoria" shows Leighton in the zenith of his power, one of the processional themes for which he is famous. The scene is at Thebes, a festival in honor of Apollo. Some, yes, many, claim "Cymon and Iphigenia," as showing Leighton's greatest power and personality. It embodies the thought that physical beauty might

lead the soul to the higher plane of spiritual perfection.

His last picture, unfinished at his death, "Clytie," the nymph who loved the sun, kneeling at an altar of white marble, with outstretched arms, appeals to the god not to desert her, and is answered by a flash of radiance which pervades the entire form. This painting occupies a screen in his beautiful home which he, dying unmarried, bequeathed to the British nation. His frescoes, prepared for the South Kensington museum, "The Arts of War" and "The Arts of Peace," where they still remain, as well as the mural decorations of Victoria and Albert hall, show his strength in grouping and composing large designs with many figures.

His Sculpture.

Two of his best bronze statues are at the Tate gallery, London. The "Athlete Wrestling with the Python" is the work of three years. The strength of the design is in the curves of the athlete's body, the massive head, and repeated in the coils of the serpent, emphasized by the great tension of muscles. The "Sluggard" was suggested by a model stretching himself to rest. He also designed the figure on Mrs. Browning's monument at Florence, and the medal for the queen's jubilee. As President of the Royal Academy he was a finished gentleman, much sought conversationalist, lecturer, brilliant

chairman and speaker at banquets, and companion of princes; his culture and fine taste could always be depended upon to do the most suitable and satisfactory thing. It was due to his seal that the winter exhibit of loans of old masters was inaugurated at the Royal academy.

He was knighted by the queen but a few months before his death. He was buried with great honor, near other artists in the crypt of St. Paul's cathedral. His beautiful home in Holland Park road, London, is filled with his own works and the rare art treasures he had collected. The famous Arab hall, so unique and exquisite, is worthy of many visits.
