

THREE GENERALS VICTIMS OF REDS

Russian Assassins Follow Stolypin Tragedy with Swift Death for Three Officers.

ATTEMPT TO GET AT CZAR IS THWARTED

Revolutionists Caught in Palace Grounds with Deadly Bomb in a Fruit Basket.

ASSASSIN'S SCORE

Social revolutions have done bloody work in the past forty-eight hours. The record for that time is:

- Killed: General von Liarliarski, Warsaw. Colonel Rieman, Seminevsky guard. General Min, czar's adjutant. Thirty-two at Stolypin reception. Attempted assassinations: Emperor Nicholas. Premier Stolypin. General Kaubars, Odessa.

Warsaw, Aug. 27.—General von Liarliarski, acting military governor general of Warsaw, was shot and killed at 11 p.m. today, while riding in his car. The assassin escaped. This morning an unknown man warned the cabmen of the city generally not to drive any of the generals.

General von Liarliarski was the commander of the fifth army corps, stationed at Warsaw.

Guard Colonel Killed.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 27.—A report reached here late this afternoon that Colonel Rieman of the Seminevsky guard regiment had been assassinated at Luga, where he was on his way to Warsaw to take up a position on the staff of General Skallon, governor general of Warsaw.

Revolution by Bomb.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 27.—Revolution by revolt is dead; revolution by terrorism is revived. Such is the situation in Russia today.

A frustrated attempt by revolutionists, armed with bombs, to kill the czar at the same time the attack was made on the premier; the attempt on the life of Premier Stolypin, with its frightful results; the shooting of General Min, an adjutant of the czar's personal staff, the assassination of General von Liarliarski, military governor general of Warsaw; the plot to kill General Kaubars at Odessa, which miscarried thru the nervousness of the girl who carried the bomb—all within forty-eight hours—appear to be part of a gigantic plot involving the lives of all heads of the government from the czar downward. Since the czar dissolved the duma, he no longer enjoys immunity from the terrorists.

Czar Has Narrow Escape.

Simultaneously with the attack upon Premier Stolypin's villa Saturday, an attempt was made to enter Peterhof palace and kill the czar.

Police Are Puzzled.

The secret police are at their wits' ends, trying to discover the bomb factories and the organization to observe unusual vigilance, arrested one of the two would-be assassins near the palace wall, where he was crouching waiting to effect an entrance. He was armed with a bomb concealed in a basket of fruit. Later his accomplice was found inside the park, crouching under the branches of a tree. Both men were quickly identified with the names of members of the Moscow terrorists.

GIRL KILLS GENERAL

Shoots Officer Down in Station at Peterhof.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 27.—General Min, commander of the Seminevsky guard regiment and a personal adjutant to the suite of the czar, was shot to death by a mere slip of a girl at the Peterhof railway station last night.

The assassination is directly in line with a proclamation issued by the central committee of the social revolutionists, which declares that unless the government forthwith alters its policy such acts as the attempt on Premier Stolypin's life will be pursued to the utmost and government representatives will be killed by hand.

Mme. Min Captures Girl.

The assassin was captured at once and the capture was due to the prompt action of General Min's wife, who seized the girl and held her until an officer arrived.

The daughter of Premier Stolypin, who was injured by the bomb explosion in the premier's summer home Saturday and who was erroneously reported to have died, is better today.

SLAYS SELF IN STORE WITH NEW REVOLVER

He died within a few minutes.



WHOLE TOWNS JOIN INSURRECTIONISTS, MAYORS LEADING IN ARMED REVOLT.


Havana, Aug. 27.—President Palma today gave out a statement in which he says that the insurrection has no ideals and no program.

"This is my first resolution," President Palma declared today, "and I shall maintain it at the cost of my life. I understand my duties and responsibilities to the people. Such is the only method of ending institutions and civilization."

Palma May Quit

Grave differences between President Palma and Vice President Mendez Capote have added to the suspense of the revolution. The latter is suspected of having conspired with Senator Alfredo Zayas, president of the liberal party, the question of whether peace could be restored by Palma's withdrawal from the presidency, by permitting Mendez Capote to succeed him, and by giving certain posts to the liberals.
