W. H. WILLIAMS AS A LD CANDIDATE

M. O. ASPIRANT FOR MAYORALTY RIDICULES SALOON MEN.

Declares Sunday Closing Is a Permanent Fixture in Minneapolis Municipal Government and Taunts Liquor Men as Cat's Paws of Corporations—Out for Law Enforcement.

W. H. Williams, candidate for the democratic nomination for mayor against Mayor Hayes and Ames, has declared for law enforcement as a part of his platform. At a democratic and municipal-ownership meeting in the Journal building last night Williams came out flat-footed for his policy in a way that will add a new interest to the local mayoralty contest.

"The Sunday closing proposition is a closed incident in Minneapolis," declared Mr. Williams. "Neither Mr. Hayes, Dr. Williams nor even 'Doc' Ames can open the saloons of this city on Sunday, and you saloonkeepers that are here can take that from me and go tell the others in the business, that I am running on a law enforcement platform. You have been played for suckers and bought with a hue and cry of 'anything to beat Jones and open the saloons on Sunday.' It can't be done. Any body of citizens in this city can close the saloons after the first attempt to open them, and by following it up can keep them closed. There are enough people in Minneapolis who will insist on it and fight for it, to force any man elected mayor, into keeping things shut tight, and it can be done. If I am nominated and elected, not part of the law, but all of it, and I want every saloonkeeper in Minneapolis to know it."

Used as Cat's Paw. "All this noise about beating the Sunday closing is stirred up for another purpose. The saloonkeepers and saloon interests of Minneapolis have been made the cat to pull the strings of the municipal ownership issue in Minneapolis is municipal ownership and public service corporation control. The gas company and the street railway company are planning to spend it for the benefit of the corporations. When it comes to being wise, the corporations of this town have got the saloonkeepers beat a mile, but the saloonkeepers don't know it."

Where Williams Stands. "There has been some question as to where I stood on this subject. Mayor Jones has been placed on one side. Hayes, Dr. Williams and Doc Ames have been placed in another place. For the benefit of the people of Minneapolis, their representatives here I want to place myself, and here is where I stand. I am for law enforcement to the letter, and for municipal ownership and control to the letter. I am for every ward in this city, and with the public behind me we can force the council, I think. This can be done anyway if the people of this city will simply organize into a council and demand their rights."

Speakers for "M. O." The meeting was not large, but the fact made no difference with the quality or quantity of the speeches. J. W. Bennett, a writer on municipal ownership, gave an exhaustive address on that subject, dealing particularly with municipal gas plants and taking up the management of the local plant. He closed with an appeal for organization for the purpose of taking over corporation properties.

Other speakers were Frank D. Larabee, candidate for congress, who confined himself to national politics, and S. A. Stockwell, president of the Minneapolis Municipal Ownership League, who spoke earnestly in favor of taking over corporation properties. The speakers urged the voters to stick to the party ranks and not vote the republican ticket at the primaries.

Announcement was made of a municipal ownership mass meeting to be held in the Auditorium Monday evening, Sept. 10. Mayor Duane of Chicago, Governor Johnson, Judge Cant and other prominent men will speak. Prominent women, it is said, will speak in favor of a municipal gas plant furnishing cheaper fuel for the housewives of Minneapolis.

FINISH CHARTER DRAFT

CHARTER COMMISSIONERS GET DOCUMENT INTO SHAPE FOR EXPERT CRITICISM.

The charter commission last night heard the final report of the drafting committee which has had in charge the licking of the instrument into shape. There was discussion on only one chapter, that on franchises, and several amendments were made. The one which caused the most debate was the initiative and referendum clause, which was stricken out by a vote of 6 to 3.

Several safeguards were thrown about the granting of franchises in other amendments. The chapter on improvements was amended to permit the city council to lay water mains and supply water at a reasonable cost outside the city. This may become of great importance in view of the probability of the Armour plant being located just outside of Minneapolis.

The charter will be printed within a few days, but this will not be a final draft. It is the purpose of the commissioners to have the charter in proof form submitted to heads of departments, corporations, labor bodies and commercial organizations, for further criticism. Amendments suggested will be considered and if adopted will be incorporated in the final draft. A public committee of five will take charge of bringing the charter before the public.

J. W. Arctander Does Not Wish to Be Consigned to Metlakatla.

A few days ago The Journal contained a statement to the effect that John W. Arctander was a resident of Metlakatla, Alaska, and that visitors to Annette island had gained the impression that he had about made up his mind to settle down there permanently and might ultimately become the head of the community developed by Father Duncan. Mr. Arctander writes to The Journal to say that he regrets this publication because it is his purpose to return to Minneapolis and continue his law business here; that he has maintained his law office here thru the services of his assistants, and that Minneapolis is still good enough for him. He is very much in love with the Alaska summer climate, and for that reason wishes to spend his vacations there, but does not wish to be thought of as having sacrificed any of his rights and privileges as a citizen of Minneapolis.

HIGH OFFICERS ARE HERE

WEST PROVINCE HOLDS ANNUAL OFFICERS' CONGRESS—PROGRAM OF MEETINGS.

Commissioner and Mrs. George Kilby of Chicago, the western commanders of the Salvation Army, arrived in Minneapolis today to attend the annual officers' congress of the Northwestern province, which opened here last night. The commissioner and his wife were expected to be here for the opening meeting, but were detained in Chicago by the illness of Colonel Miles, chief of staff.

Despite the absence of the territorial commander, the opening services last night were well attended. More than 500 persons attended the open-air meeting held at Nicollet avenue and Fourth street at 7 p.m., and the majority of them followed the band to the hall at 218 First avenue S. where Brigadier J. W. Cousins conducted a welcome meeting. Among the officers who assisted the provincial commander were Ensign and Mrs. Jackson of Fargo, N. D., Major Merrittweather, Major Millsaps, Staff Captain Watt, Ensign Cowles, Captain Peacock and the provincial band. About fifty delegates from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa and North Dakota were in attendance last night, and more are expected.

Today was given over entirely to the work of the congress. Special officers' councils were held in the council chamber of the old city hall, both morning and afternoon. This evening there will be a meeting for officers and soldiers only at the first avenue hall. Similar officers' councils will be held Wednesday.

Tomorrow night the final public meeting of the congress will be held in the Hennepin Avenue Methodist church at 7:15 p.m. The Salvationists will rally in the open air and, headed by three brass bands, march to the church. Commissioner Kilby will be the principal speaker at this service.
