GUTTERSEN SAYS NO TO McCLEARY

Belated Overtures for Debates by Second District Candidates Are Declined.

Mankato, Minn., Aug. 31.—Gilbert Gutteresen has turned the tables very neatly on Congressman McCleary, who wrote him that he had noticed in the newspapers that he was a candidate and challenged him to a series of joint debates. In his reply Mr. Gutteresen says:
"Lake Crystal, Minn., Aug. 29.—Hon. J. T. McCleary, Mankato, Minn. Dear Sir: Your letter of Aug. 27, inviting me to engage in a series of joint debates with you, was received yesterday. In view of the fact that my plans for the remaining twenty days of the anti-primary campaign were made some time ago, and that I have not at my disposal a force of government clerks to take charge of my campaign headquarters, and the further fact that I have been discussing the issues set forth in my platform with the voters, individually and collectively, for many weeks, I cannot accept your seemingly late offer.
"I have been an avowed candidate for the congressional nomination since April 1, and on April 4, made my announcement, and prior to that time fled for said nomination and wrote you the following personal letter:
"Porter, Minn., March 27.—Hon. J. T. McCleary, Washington, D. C. Dear Sir: I have decided to become a candidate for republican nomination of congressman from the second Minnesota district, and assure you that it will be of my own free will, and not a result of your not being a candidate, I shall expect to receive from you as loyal support as I have extended to you in the past.
"I once promised you to notify you if I resigned from the rural service, and you may consider this my notification.
"In view of the above facts, it seems strange to me that you have seemingly just discovered 'thru the papers' that I am a candidate. Had you made this challenge early, I could have arranged to accept it.

GIRL OF EIGHTEEN RESCUES 3 IN PERIL

Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 31.—One of the most heroic rescues in the history of Maumee took place yesterday when Iva Taylor, single-handed and at the peril of her own life, pulled to the surface by her half-drowned persons from the Maumee river.
The affair took place at Pioneer Inn, a summer resort near Toledo. A party of three, Alberta and her brother, Washington, D. C., and C. A. Foote of Toledo, were in bathing. Alberta went beyond her depth and sank. Grace, an expert swimmer, went to her rescue, but was pulled beneath the surface by her drowning sister. A daring attempt saved the girls was made by Foote, but he became exhausted after a few minutes' battle, and was also dragged under.
Cries for help brought to their assistance Iva Taylor, a young girl 18 years old. Being an expert oarswoman she jumped into a boat and rapidly rowed to the scene, where one by one she managed to drag the three into the boat in a half-drowned condition. Returning to the shore eager hands lent assistance and all were resuscitated.

LAW OF LAND LIFTED FOR SORROWING ALIENS

New York, Aug. 31.—When the family of Samuel Koenig, father, mother and a little boy and girl—arrived at Ellis island from an immigrant ship, they looked all right. Mrs. Koenig, the mother, Mrs. Schlenoff, who was to have met them and piloted them to her home in the strange city. They could not find her.
They were told later that she had died the day before. Miss Puckett was to be buried Thursday. The sorrowing family were preparing to leave the island to be present at the funeral when a new misfortune overtook them.
The little daughter, who had eye trouble and the government inspectors refused to permit the family to leave the island without her for fear that they would not be able to find her again.
Lawyer Samuel Koenig heard of their sad plight. He at once began to work for them. Lawyer Koenig telegraphed to Washington. Finally the answer came. It was joy to the family in their affliction, for the law of the land was lifted in their case.

WOMAN CLERK GOT THOUSANDS BY FRAUD

Washington, Aug. 31.—Miss Eulalie Puckett, a clerk in the agriculture department, who was arrested on a charge of forging the name of Mrs. Fannie Spriggs Perry to a formal application for a loan of \$6,000, has confessed that she has been carrying on similar transactions for the past two years.
In October, 1905, Miss Puckett obtained two loans on property belonging to Annie E. McKnight. She obtained \$800 on her first deed of trust and \$1,000 on the second. She confessed further that she had made an application for a loan of \$1,500. To this application she signed the name of Mrs. Mary Vockey.
Miss Puckett is on the rolls of the agriculture department at \$40 a month. To the police she gave her age as 35.

NEW THING IN DORMITORIES

Washing Dishes Proposed as Part of Nebraska Normal Curriculum.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 31.—To wash dishes and cook breakfasts and dinners as a part of the regular curriculum is the idea which is being developed by President James W. Crabtree of the state normal school at Peru, in the construction of a model boarding dormitory for girls.
The new plan is to connect the department of domestic science with self-boarding by offering a three course in domestic science. The model self-board dormitory under process of construction will be completed by Sept. 12, the date on which the school opens.
