BROTHERS SHOT BY MAN THEY POUNDED

GEORGE AND VINCENT DADEY PICK WRONG MAN.

John Likar, After Trying to Rid Himself of Rowdies Who Break His Fence, Is Chased and Beaten—On Return Attack He Wings Tormentors with Revolver.

Determined to defend his life and property, John Likar, 312 Washington avenue S, shot George and Vincent Dadey, brothers, who attacked him in his own house last night.

George was wounded in the neck and Vincent was slightly wounded in the head. They were both able to go home after their wounds were dressed at the city hospital.

Likar gave himself up to the South Side police after the shooting and told his story of the affair. He says that his assailants returned from a visit to several saloons and began tearing his fence down. He tried to persuade them to go away and at his interference they attacked him and chased him into his house, where they gave him a severe beating. Then Likar went to another room, pulled a revolver from a drawer and ordered the men to leave. He fired twice in the air and they again advanced on him. The second time he shot straight and both men fell to the floor. Thinking he had killed both, Likar bade his goodbyes and went directly to the South Side station, where he asked to be locked up. A charge of assault was placed against him.

Likar was dismissed in police court last night, as no one was willing to swear out a complaint.
