## CZAR'S PROGRAM IS MADE PUBLIC

Reforms Are Promised, but Repressive Measures Will Be Rigidly Enforced.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 6.—An official communication embodying the whole government program was published last night. The program embraces court-martial for political crimes and an increase of the penalties for revolutionary propaganda and expresses a firm determination to preserve order. It also promises a liberal measure of reforms and the abolition of useless restrictions on Jews.

Measures for greater provincial autonomy are promised. Zemstvos will be introduced in Poland and the Baltic provinces and an income tax will be instituted. Reforms in the police and other public services also are promised. The communication, which was issued after protracted discussion by Premier Stolypin and the council of ministers, leaves the situation but little altered. The one thing evident is that the premier intends to carry out broad reforms on one hand and to pursue a policy of repression on the other. The establishment of court-martial for political crimes signifies the supplanting of the civil courts wherever "extraordinary insecurity" exists.

An imperial ukase instituting this law was issued after the publication of the communication. It empowers governors general, where martial law or extraordinary insecurity exist, to place civilians or military men charged with crime upon trial before a military court consisting of five officers, the trial to take not longer than seventy-two hours from the beginning of the process to the execution of the verdict. This is entirely a new law, as heretofore the only military or naval mutinies and uprisings were occasions for court-martial. Practically the whole of Russia is now under this category.

The program as announced is now the full program of the government, which probably will be issued at the end of September or early in October. A general meeting of Octoberists and peaceful regenerationists will be held soon. It is believed that the Octoberists will dissolve or merge with the peaceful regenerationists.

### Liberties for Church.

The long struggle of the Georgian people to retain the autonomy of the Georgian church, lost after the incorporation of the ancient kingdom with Russia, which has been carried on by interdict and boycott and all the other means at the disposal of the patriotic church and people, has resulted in a partial victory. The emperor, on the recommendation of the holy synod, has declared the creation of a church council composed of three Georgian bishops, of which body a Russian archbishop will be only the nominal head, and the restoration of the old Georgian language to its place in church literature. A commission has also been created to translate the Bible into modern Georgian.

### BIDS WORLD FAREWELL

Finan of New York, were yesterday invested with the black veil of the order of Mount Carmel. Under their vows their faces will never again be seen even in death by mortals, except the dignitaries of the order. Miss McSorley's relatives at Red Wing are reputed wealthy, as are Miss Finan's relatives. Many church dignitaries from other points attended the exercises, and Miss McSorley's relatives from Minnesota, were here in force. Archbishop O'Connell of Boston invested the girls with the veil. Rev. William D. Keane of Jersey City, sang the mass.

## SELLS HIS WIFE, THEN DRINKS FATAL POISON

Salt Lake, Utah, Sept. 6.—After making out a bill of sale of his wife and placing it in an envelope addressed to a supposed friend, C. W. Wiley committed suicide in Ogden by swallowing morphine. Wiley came from Sparks, Nev., where he was yardmaster for the Southern Pacific.  
After breakfast Wiley went to his room, where he was found later in an unconscious condition. He fought against any means being taken to re-

live him. In an envelope addressed to the supposed friend the following was found:  
"Sparks, Aug. 3, 1906.—To Fred Schneider: For and in consideration of your manly acts, I this day deliver unto you one wife, known as Mrs. May E. Wiley, to take and dispose of as you wish.—W. C. Wiley, husband."  
Another letter left by Wiley was: "Ogden, Sept. 6.—My Dear Babbits: Papa bids you goodby. Do not, under any circumstances, return to the woman you have called mama for the past six years, as she has caused all this trouble, also this fall I am going to take. She will get her pay, so goodby.—W. C. Wiley."

Some believe Longworth's turning down forecasts his defeat for re-election to congress.


# TOMORROW IS MINNEAPOLIS DAY
