IMPORTANT CHANGE IN ROWING RULES

London, Sept. 6.—An important change was made in the Cambridge-Harvard university boat race, to the effect that if at any point either boat is damaged by accident to either, not due to the fault of any individual and materially affecting the result, the umpire is empowered to re-start the race with the same or other boats. Similarly the race may be re-started if either boat should be interfered with by a steamer, barge or other obstacle.

Railroads

WISCONSIN CENTRAL GAINS Annual Report Shows that Road Shares in General Prosperity. Gross earnings of the Wisconsin Central for the fiscal year were \$7,151,940, as shown in the report to the state railroad commission, filed in 1905 earnings were \$6,648,285. With operating expenses \$4,580,288 and miscellaneous income of \$90,155, the road shows net income of \$2,661,807. Of this sum \$1,138,234 was paid for interest on funded debt, \$54,280 for interest on current debt, \$289,679 for taxes and \$376,826 for rental of terminals, leaving a net income of \$498,018. This sum is to be paid. The net income was added to the old surplus of \$489,643. From these deductions were made for improvements, new lines and similar betterments amounting to \$438,571, leaving the surplus at \$869,160. The previous year the operating expenses were \$4,374,336, the income from operation \$2,779,949 and the net income \$555,844.

LAKE SERVICE CHANGED

New train service to Lake Minnetonka will be put in effect by the St. Louis road next Sunday in place of the summer schedule. A train will leave Tonka bay at 7:10 a. m., reaching Minneapolis at 8 a. m. The return train will leave Minneapolis at 5:35 p. m., reaching the bay at 6:25 p. m. The Sunday train will leave Minneapolis at 9:45 a. m., returning from Tonka Bay at 5 p. m. New electric-lighted sleepers have been put in service on the Des Moines train from St. Paul to Minneapolis. Travelers will find the service improved materially by the addition of the new lights.

MORE TRACKS AT BILLINGS

Billings, Mont., Sept. 6.—In order to overcome the congested conditions in the local freight yards in this city, the Northern Pacific road has been compelled to enlarge its yardage, and is putting in twelve additional tracks. The present yards will accommodate 1,200 cars, and under the new regime about 1,700 may be handled with ease. Many trains have been delayed on account of not being able to get in and out of the city while the main lines were being used for switch purposes.
