ROOT DECORATED BY LIMA'S MAYOR

American Party Is Warmly Welcomed to the Capital of Peru.

Lima, Peru, Sept. 11.—Elihu Root, American secretary of state, and his party, who arrived at Callao yesterday were brought immediately to Lima, Mr. Root riding in President Pardo's carriage and being accompanied by the mayor of the city. The streets were lined with crowds who cheered enthusiastically.

On arriving at the town hall Mr. Root was ushered into the council room where the members of the city council and public were waiting to greet him. The mayor of Lima, in a speech of welcome, said: "We sympathize with the doctrine you proclaim and extend with sincere regard the great hand of friendship. We feel pride and satisfaction at the progress of your country. Soon the vigorous arm of your people will divide the strip of land which still separates the two oceans. The spirits of Washington and Bolivar in space watch over the maintenance of peace and justice and follow the destiny of the republics which they created. We shall ever retain a grateful impression of your visit."

The mayor then fixed upon the breast of Mr. Root and his party gold badges upon which were stamped the arms of the city of Lima. Afterwards Secretary Root and party visited President Pardo, with whom Mr. Root had a long chat.

At the residence which has been assigned for the use of Mr. Root and his party during their stay here, President Pardo returned the visit of Mr. Root. Secretary Root was entertained last night at the president's mansion.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY ENDS WASTED LIFE

Man, Long a Fugitive, Returns and Kills Wife and Self.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Sept. 11.—Raymond C. Rossman, 38 years old, more than a year a fugitive from justice, appeared yesterday in the pretty village of Hyde Park, where his wife had been living for several months. At twilight Rossman, with his wife's home, drove her from the house at the point of a revolver, pursued her thru the village streets and shot her in the shadow of the Methodist church, shot her dead. Then standing at the head of his prostrate wife, Rossman turned the revolver on himself and sent two bullets thru his own heart.

The tragedy was on the part of the man, the end of a dissolute life. Rossman married a dozen years ago, the wealthy widow of Horace Morehouse, who had one daughter, now 20 years of age.

Rossman squandered his wife's money and about two years ago it was discovered that he had committed a gross crime upon his stepdaughter. He jumped bail and fled.

DEMOCRACY BEST PROP OF PRESIDENT--W. J. B.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 10.—William J. Bryan gave out a statement today, announcing that as soon as he returned from his southeastern trip he would enter the campaign in Nebraska and several other states. Touching on the candidacy of Ashton C. Shallenberger, fusion nominee for governor, Mr. Bryan said: "He is not only in favor of the right of the people to elect their own representatives, but in favor of the enforcement of railroad regulation and the 2-cent passenger fare, but he advocated government ownership of railroads before I did."

Mr. Bryan continued: "The vote this year will be taken as an indication of the trend of public sentiment. We are entering upon a great fight for the extermination of the trusts." The republican party has shown its inability to deal effectively with these and kindred subjects. Wherever the republican has attempted to do anything he has been compelled to follow the democratic rather than the republican platform, and the republicans in the house and senate have not supported him.

"The best way to stand by the president is to elect democrats to congress and the senate, for the democrats have done for the president better than the republicans upon the most important questions."

FOREIGNERS FEAR HOSTILE CHINESE

Awakening of Slumbering Giant Arouses Terror—English Hardest Hit.

Washington, Sept. 11.—Mail advices from China are disquieting to Americans having financial interests in the orient. There is no abatement of the anti-foreign feeling and the animosity is no longer confined to Americans, but includes all foreigners except Japanese. A formidable party has arisen and is conducting an active propaganda. It is known as "restorer of rights," and its purpose is to drive the foreigners out of business in China, and to that end to begin by rendering valueless the foreign investments.

In some quarters the Chinese government is alleged to sympathize with the movement, and at any rate capitalists interested in important concessions are complaining that the Chinese officials are deliberately destroying their holdings and violating their agreements at every turn.

More than any other nationality the English are said to be injuriously affected by this attitude of the Chinese government. The English are complaining that in violation of an agreement the Chinese government is constructing a railway from Shanghai southward through the deliberate purpose of destroying the English concession in Hongkong and greatly injuring Hongkong, and there are allegations that mining concessions granted to British subjects have been held up and the concessionaires embarrassed.

Some of the great British business interests are uniting in strong appeals to their government to adopt a stronger attitude and protect them in their Chinese enterprises.

CRUISER DES MOINES ON MYSTERIOUS CRUISE

Portsmouth, Va., Sept. 11.—The United States protected cruiser Des Moines, commander Abraham E. Culver, went to sea last night under sealed orders. On Sunday orders were sent to the naval magazine here for a large consignment of ammunition of small caliber, which was prepared and hustled aboard the Des Moines, together with a big shipment of stores.

The departure of the steamship Marie Herrera from New York on Saturday with a big consignment of arms and ammunition to be used in suppressing the Cuban revolution and the secrecy with which the course and destination of that vessel are being guarded, adds strength to the supposition that the sailing of the Des Moines may have something to do with the Herrera's departure. The cruiser took a southerly course after passing Cape Henry.

U. S. TROOPS RUSHED TO MEXICAN BORDER

Bisbee, I. T., Sept. 11.—Troop A, Fifth cavalry, passed thru Naco on the way to Douglas Sunday night. They are ostensibly on a practice march, but it is believed here they are out for guard duty in the event of an outbreak against the Mexican government or against American residents in Mexico. Another troop will reach Douglas last night also.

Troop B, Fifth cavalry, under command of Captain McClure, with ten days' field rations left Naco yesterday. Three other troops have left Fort Huachuca for a destination not known, said to be on the border. It is rumored the troops from Fort Bliss, Tex., have been ordered to Nogales.

PULAJANES KILL A SCOUT LIEUTENANT

Manila, Sept. 11.—Lieutenant R. E. Treadwell of the Philippine scouts was killed last night by Pulajanes, six miles south of Baranay. He was in command of a small detachment of scouts whose bivouac was attacked during the night by a band of about one hundred Pulajanes. The lieutenant Treadwell was the only man hit. Troops are in pursuit of the band.

Sixty troops and forty constabulary struck a band of Pulajanes near Sitio Karaban, killed one and wounded several. The rest of the band escaped. The troops sustained no casualties and destroyed a large quantity of supplies gathered by the Pulajanes.

TRANSCONTINENTAL RUN SHATTERS OLD RECORD

New York, Sept. 11.—L. J. Mueller of Cleveland arrived at Columbus Circle at 9:13 last night on his auto cycle, having broken the record for the 3,568-mile run from San Francisco to New York by more than seven days, and the best previous one-man automobile performance by a day and a half. Mueller's exact time was 31 days 12 hours and 13 minutes.

TEN NEAR TO DEATH, POISON IN DRIED BEEF

Kalamazoo, Mich., Sept. 11.—Ten persons in three different families of this city have been lying at the point of death for over twelve hours suffering from the effects of eating dried beef delivered to their homes Saturday by a man who cannot be located. The physicians are of the opinion that some sort of exalting fluid, used as a preservative, was used in the beef and was the cause of the poisoning.


DETAILED ON A BRIDGE
