VARSITY PREPARES FOR OPENING DAY

STUDENTS BRAVE RAIN TO REGISTER.

Indications Are That More Young Men and Women Than Ever Before Will Enter Various Departments—Alice Shevlin Hall Nears Completion, but Other Buildings Have Been Delayed.

A larger crowd than has before appeared at the University of Minnesota for the fall registration lined up there today. In spite of the rain and bad weather the registrar and committees were all busy arranging the work of the students.

Four hundred and seventy-five students registered in the first two days. Most of these are upper classmen, because the freshmen are required to take entrance examinations in English and mathematics. These examinations are being held, and consequently the registration of freshmen will be later than usual this year.

The college of dentistry has far more students this year than before, and all the professional schools are increasing in numbers.

New Buildings Not Ready. None of the new buildings being erected at the university is ready for use. All have been delayed but are being rushed with all possible speed.

Alice Shevlin hall, the new women's building, built on the site of the old main building, is practically completed, with the exception of the furnishing and the painting of the interior.

There will be no classes in the building save those run by the girls themselves in the rear of the building and rest rooms beside one large living room on the first floor. Everything has been done to make it the true home of the girls on the campus. The hall will be ready Nov. 1.

The "Institute of Public Health and Pathology" building, which has been erected in the rear of the library building, is almost completed and will be ready for use in two months. This new building was built to relieve the pressure for room in the medical building.

The new main building, which is being erected on University avenue, is almost completed. The building is to be ready Sept. 1, 1907. The botanical building, on University avenue, across the railroad tracks from the campus, will not be occupied for some time.
