City News

BOYS' DEPARTMENT
OF Y. M. C. A. OPENS

RECEPTION WILL BE HELD FRI-
DAY EVENING.

Invitation is General to All Lads to
Enjoy Hospitality of Department and
Learn Something of Work Being
Done—Gym Classes to Be Formed
Next Week.

The boys' department of the Young
Men's Christian association will hold a
fall opening Friday, at 7:30 p.m., at the
boys' club house, 916 Mary place. It
will be in the nature of a reception to
boys, and all boys more than 12 years
of age, whether members or not, are
cordially invited to come.
A gymnasium exhibition will be
given by some of the members of the
boys' department. During the evening
an interesting program will be
given at the club house, consisting of
singing and music. Refreshments will
be served. There will be a large corps
of older fellows who will show all
strangers around and everything will be
made as interesting and entertaining as
possible.

Fall Work Starts.
The fall work starts the first of next
week, when the gymnasium classes will
start. All the other departments of
the work will be in full blast by Oct. 1.
The delegation of boys who attended
the Lake Geneva boys' conference this
summer are all determined to put in
their best efforts in the interest of
other boys. Their watchword will be
"Help the Other Fellow." A number
of the delegates will teach boys' Bible
classes. Special attention will be
given to Bible classes the coming year.
There will be classes for every group
and it is hoped that a greater number
of boys will be in classes. There will
be the regular Sunday afternoon meet-
ings, the first at 2:35 for the younger,
and the second at 4:30 for the older
boys. These meetings are not restrict-
ed to members only, but are open to all
boys in the city.

Night Schools.
The night school for employed boys
will open again the first week in Octo-
ber. This year the studies have been
grouped into two courses, the elemen-
tary, consisting of elementary arithme-
tic, penmanship and spelling; and the
advanced, consisting of advanced arith-
metic, penmanship and business Eng-
lish. An elementary course in book-
keeping will also be given.
Owing to the lack of room for the
accommodation of the night school
work the number of students will be
limited to 125 for each term.

MANUAL TRAINING ASKED

MANY PUPILS BARRED FROM
SPECIAL COURSES BECAUSE OF
LIMITATION OF DEPARTMENT.

When the board of education ascer-
tains just where it stands with regard
to financing it will take up the question
of extending the manual training
course. At present this practical course
is limited to the four high schools and
five grade schools, namely, the Blaine,
Douglas, Mason, Sheridan and Sheri-
dan schools. In the latter schools cook-
ing classes are also conducted.
It must be understood that pupils
having attained certain grades may
take manual training or domestic sci-
ence, but they will be obliged to go in
many cases to other schools. Thus, the
Sheridan school, on Broadway and Uni-
versity avenue NE, supplies the want
of the entire East Side. Likewise, the
Blaine school is intended to accommo-
date the North Side even beyond Cam-
den Place. There is not only a con-
siderable waste of time, but some out-
lay for travel.

It is known that a great many pu-
pils would like to take manual train-
ing or domestic science, if more favor-
able opportunities were offered. Last
year hundreds of pupils were turned
away on account of lack of room, and
this experience will be repeated, un-
less the board provides increased fa-
cilities.
J. E. Painter, supervisor of manual
training, wants the board to provide a
workshop in every school building in the
city where there are enough children
who have reached the required age.
The initial cost will be somewhat
greater, but the plan will be much more
satisfactory and effective than the pre-
sent plan of centralizing. He would
make the teachers travel instead of the
children.
Practically the same arguments in
favor of this plan apply to the cook-
ing and sewing schools.

GREEK IS NOT POPULAR

State High School Inspector Reports on
General Work.

George B. Aiton, state high school in-
spector, has filed his report with the de-
partment of public instruction. It
shows a gain by high schools in at-
tendance of 9 per cent, from 20,215 to
22,106.
The number studying Greek has de-
creased from 214 in 1895 to 24 in 1906.
In one year the number studying higher
algebra decreased from 2,014 to 1,941,
and those taking solid geometry from
2,014 to 1,947. Commercial and indus-
trial subjects show a large increase in
the number of pupils taking them.
Just half the districts reported an
increase in the tax rate and half a de-
crease. Among the superintendents,
thirty-four received less than \$1,000,
forty-nine less than \$1,200, forty-nine
less than \$1,400, twenty-one less than
\$1,600, twenty-four less than \$2,000 and
nineteen received \$2,000 or more. The
lowest salary paid assistants is \$450,
and out of 800 only about twenty were
paid this minimum.

New Land Being Opened Up in Texas.
