

JONES' LID POLICY HELPS RETAILERS

SMALL MERCHANTS TESTIFY TO BETTER BUSINESS.

Interviews with Men in Retail Lines All Over City Shows that Customers Pay Up Better, Have More Money, and Live on Higher Level than Formerly.

Minneapolis has enjoyed an era of prosperity under the administration of David P. Jones. Contrary to the statements of the Williams speakers, business has not suffered in the least, but in most instances has increased. The collections have grown easier and everything is in more satisfactory condition. Merchants and business men, as a rule, do not take an active part in politics. They often say they have not the time and do not regard it good policy, particularly when the campaign is unusually warm. In such cases it is a custom to preserve an air of impartiality and remain friends with both sides. This cautiousness has to a large extent disappeared in the present campaign, and merchants, as well as other voters, do not hesitate to tell just what they think.

This was the experience met with by a number of Journal reporters who went out to canvass the business men in the various trade centers scattered throughout the residence districts. Trade is better, for the men engaged in it say so. Not a single one of the men interviewed made trade better, but the oft-repeated charge that the Jones' policy is driving money, trade and people away from the city, is refuted by the unanimous verdict of the men who would feel the effect of such a movement first of all—the small merchants in the residence districts.

Business Is Good.

Even those who are avowed supporters of Dr. U. G. Williams readily admit that their business interests have suffered under the Jones regime. For instance, a number of Williams' supporters will be found on Lake street near Bloomington avenue, among them such men as C. M. Pardoe, the druggist on the corner, and H. W. Henneman, the wall paper dealer at 1543 2d street. Mr. Pardoe said that he had no fault to find with either Mr. Jones or his policy, and that he approved heartily of both. At the same time he intended to vote for Dr. Williams because he and Williams are old friends. Mr. Henneman endorsed the Jones administration in the heartiest language, but for personal reasons will vote for some one else.

People Have More Money.

L. M. Turnquist of Boston Shoe Store, 1427 East Franklin—Our business is better. People have more money and everybody is contented. We are for Jones and his administration, out and out.
