the Darrow hospital in Moorhead and gave the name of Bendeke. She received letters from Pittsburg, Pembina county. The child was born two weeks ago. Yesterday she left the hospital and registered at a hotel in Fargo under the same name. Last night she left the hotel with the baby and returned an hour later without it.


