Williams were surprised at the small showing he succeeded in making. At no time was there any serious contest in a few precincts. The Williams organization put up a hard, systematic campaign and was picked to win by many of the party wheelhorses. The Haynes faction, however, made up yesterday for what it had failed to do in the way of preliminary work and organization. It was plentifully supplied with munitions of war and was putting it where it would do the most good. In addition, Haynes had the active support of every democratic alderman, and with it the help of the local organizations.

The Haynes has the nomination, he still has a real fight ahead. There are active elements in the party who are preparing to get out and fight him to a finish, and they did not show up especially strong yesterday, they will have their individual efforts to make certain. The democracy, or that part of it voting yesterday, is not for the lid. Williams took a stand on the lid, stating that he would not be elected mayor of Minneapolis on the second ballot.

Another thing that is evident is the determined effort on the part of local organizations to do the municipal election activity started by the Williams party. It is charged by the Williams supporters that a large part of the Haynes vote is based on municipal ownership, and that it was used to swamp Williams for the moral effect on the municipal ownership believers.

The question is not settled, the municipal ownership men say. They will base their fight on the platform of the party as adopted at the recent convention, and they treat the spectacle of Mr. Haynes on this strong municipal ownership platform as a joke.

It is certain that the mayor who takes the stump during the campaign he will be subjected to some hot cross-questioning from some of his audiences.

With the same districts returned Henry C. Hanke had 4,490 votes for county treasurer and George C. Merrill had 3,861. Mr. Merrill's friends admit that the chances are against his nomination.	
With eight candidates for register of deeds, the vote was split up, but in seven-four election districts A. W. Skog had as many votes as the two next highest taken together. Following are the totals for the candidates, in view of the following figures: A. W. Skog, 2,768; William E. Alber, 1,417; Horace E. Johnson, 1,302; and Edward J. Johnson, 1,284.	
Fred M. Powers and Arthur L. Jones ran closely together in the first 74 precincts, but were some distance behind Skog. Jones had 3,103 as compared with 1,687 for his nearest competitor, John A. Dahl.	
One of the most surprising of races on the county canvass was that of Fran Hoveck for county surveyor. He led W. E. Steopes from the start and at a late hour looked like a certainty.	
Dr. J. M. Kistler is nominated for coroner and Duncan G. Mackenzie county superintendent of schools.	
It is not easy to tell who will be nominated as county commissioner from the second district, but the contest lies between J. W. B. Johnson, who has a slight lead, and J. Williams, the present commissioner. Five candidates sought to land in the shoes of the incumbent, but only one, William M. Knight was far ahead this afternoon and seemed to be certain of the nomination.

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**THE BLOODY SIXTH IS CLOSE AGAIN**

**Lindbergh Ahead, but Buckman Not Ready to Concede His Defeat.**

**MCCLEARY'S LEAD IS ALSO GROWING SMALL**

**Official Count May Be Required in Sixth—Bede and Stevens Easily Win.**

Two congressional contests outside of Hennepin county are showing rather close finishes. James T. McCleary has led from the start in the second district, but the returns from the other side also led C. B. Buckman in the sixth, but both districts will be closer than early reports indicated.

The sixth district will not be more than a few hundred either way. Mr. Lindbergh claims the nomination by 800 to 1,000. On returns received from the report I have an estimate to have about 500 margin. C. B. Buckman does not concede defeat, however. He said to The Journal at 2 p.m.: "It will take the official count to decide, and the result will not be more than 700 either way. So many outlying precincts are to be heard from yet that we cannot say anything definite, but from the report I have I am inclined to believe that the result will be in favor of the people of the district."

Mr. Buckman claims a plurality in Crow Wing, Todd and Douglas counties, where partial returns show Lindbergh ahead. He concedes Meeker county to Lindbergh, but claims 250 and Stearns by 150. He expects to lead in Morrison by 150, in Sherburne by 200 and in Cass by 500 to 600. He carries by counties, as indicated by The Journal's returns, show up about as follows:
