Fiercest Campaign in State's History for a Seat in the Legislature Goes Against the Partner of Senator Gamble—Winner Pledges New Fealty to the Senator's Interests.

CANTON, S. D.—The republican county convention yesterday nominated a legislative and county ticket agreeable to the primary vote on

Sept. 11. The candidates receiving the highest vote at the county primary were, by resolution, declared the nominees of the convention as follows: House, senator: Peterson, Brynjulson and Cable, house members; Hokenstad, treasurer; Kundert, auditor; Omsal, sheriff; Forest, judge of probate; Johnson, register; Lawrence, superintendent; Carlson, attorney; Olson, clerk; Noid, coroner; Cooper, surveyor. The convention instructed its legislative nominees for Senator Gamble. There is no democratic ticket.

WATERLOO, S. D.—The republican county convention was under the complete control of the organization Republicans. The convention accepted the result of the straw primary vote except for superintendent of schools. In this fight B. O. Tankersly of Henry, backed by the party leaders of Waterloo, won out against A. H. Bernard, winner of the straw vote, by 46 to 42. The test of strength between the stalwart and insurgent factions came on the vote for permanent chairman. Higgins (stalwart) winning over Wheelock (insurgent) by 42 to 38.

HOWARD, S. D.—The republican county convention was harmonious. The only fight was on treasurer and this took ten ballots to settle. Part of the ticket is stalwart and part insurgent as follows: Senator, H. H. Welch; representative, R. B. Jamison; treasurer, John Johnson; register of deeds, Guy Osburn; auditor, Moss Aaland; sheriff, George Freeman; clerk of courts, M. D. Ede; state's attorney, C. C. Caldwell; county judge, D. Brown; superintendent of schools, E. G. John; coroner, Dr. H. B. Noble.

CASTLEWOOD, S. D.—Below is the republican legislative and county ticket as nominated at the organization (Hamlin) yesterday: W. E. Green, senator; W. E. Whittemore, representative; auditor, William Marshall; treasurer, L. N. Prouty; sheriff, J. T. Jorgensen; clerk of courts, W. W. Saur; superintendent of schools, T. King; register of deeds, J. E. Davidson; county judge, A. C. Wolf; state's attorney, W. N. Skinner. The Sioux Falls party was adopted by a vote of 10 to 8. The election of Robert J. Gamble to the county seat.

MITCHELL, S. D.—The resolutions adopted by the republican county convention indicated the candidacy of Senator Gamble and instructed the representatives in the legislature to vote for his re-election. One resolution was especially severe on the "one-man boss rule," deprecating the power that has dominated the politics of the state and demanding the retirement of Senator Kittredge two years hence and the election of one man who will more strictly adhere to the policies of President Roosevelt. The following ticket was nominated: Senator, Thomas Fullerton; representative, C. F. Drake; Ethan; sheriff, H. C. Cook; treasurer, George H. Miner; auditor, H. B. Anderson; clerk of courts, C. R. B. Anderson; register of deeds, E. Brady; county judge, Winslow Abbey; county superintendent of schools, E. J. Aubrey; state's

attorney, T. J. Spangler; coroner, Dr. R. F. Dundas; surveyor, J. L. Nelson.

The democrats decided to put no ticket in nomination, but to support an independent ticket which is to be named later on a platform that will have the approval of independent voters. It is understood a ticket will be named simply for the purpose of making a fight on certain republican candidates.

BLA POINT, S. D.—The republican county convention was held at Bereford. Harmony and good interest prevailed throughout, the following ticket being nominated: Senator, J. T. Scroggs; representatives, Adam Scott, J. F. Larson, Big Springs; Lewis Ranum, Bruce; clerk of courts, George O. Kimmel; state's attorney, Ira L. Nichols; register, Henning Gassman; auditor, Charles S. Harter; treasurer, J. F. Webber; county judge, Jerome Mackay; superintendent, H. E. French; sheriff, E. E. Sherman; coroner, H. F. Elliott; surveyor, W. M. Vinson.

The democratic party and other county officials the following ticket was nominated: Senator, David Robertson; representatives, S. L. Isenhardt and W. P. Price; clerk of court, C. J. Mariner; superintendent, J. L. Hanson; state's attorney, E. J. Bull; judge of probate, W. F. Brigham; treasurer, C. E. Graves; auditor, W. J. Cobb; the convention passed a harmonious resolution, except in the adoption of the report of the committee on resolutions. The report endorsed the state platform, which favored the enactment of a primary law. This part of the resolution was amended so as to provide for the submission of a primary law to be voted upon by the people two years hence.

BRITTON, S. D.—The republican convention nominated Manning Spahr, representative; J. F. Slatogerson, treasurer; M. S. Woodard, auditor; W. O. Amplett, clerk of court; E. B. Williams, register; Miss Jessie Stewart, superintendent; O. H. Kras, state's attorney; Walter W. Thorp, judge of probate; Marshall Vincent, sheriff. The representatives in the legislature will be stalwart.

MILBANE, S. D.—The following county and legislative candidates were nominated at the republican county convention: Register, H. H. Nixon; clerk of courts, John Liggett; sheriff, Ed. A. Murray; superintendent, Walter Kerr; auditor, Charles McVicker; senator, George Merry; representatives, Ole Dugger and August Welde; county judge, George Bix. Resolutions

endorsing Senator Gamble were unanimously adopted.

CLARK, S. D.—The republican county convention was held yesterday afternoon. There were contests over the legislative tickets and for several of the county offices, and a fight over the adoption of the report of the resolutions committee. The resolutions committee returned two reports. C. G. Sherwood as secretary of the committee read the majority report and then the minority report, and moved the adoption of the latter. The minority differed from the other in that it pledged the representatives to the legislature to support the measure, and invited the records of the congressmen and senators from this state. This was a drive at Senator Kittredge.

Mr. Sherwood spoke in favor of the minority report and criticized Senator Kittredge sharply, saying that Kittredge would be the issue in this state in 1908. He bitterly arraigned the senator in a dramatic speech. The majority report was adopted by a vote of 106 to 85. There were four candidates for the lower house: W. A. Carley, H. O. Olson, T. H. Bickel and E. W. Anderson, also a contest for the office of sheriff, M. G. Eggen of Vienna defeating W. T. Furdle of Willow Lakes. A. V. Thorson, present deputy treasurer, won against A. M. Sogn. W. C. Brower, the present clerk of courts, was beaten by George Malby; and the present state's attorney, Logan Berry, was beaten by W. J. Jacobs, a young attorney of Redley. The ticket is as follows: Senator, W. M. Danforth; representatives, W. A. Carley and B. O. Olson; treasurer, A. V. Thorson; sheriff, M. G. Eggen; clerk, George Malby; state's attorney, Logan Berry; auditor, J. W. Cates; register, Frank Mills; superintendent, Hattie Pickles; county judge, O. H. Ames; surveyor, J. M. Raygood; coroner, E. T. Ramsey.
