### DRAMATIC PLOTS IN DIVORCE CASE

The Scenes and Principals in Suit Rival Comic Opera.

Journal Special Service. New York, Sept. 20.—With three states of the union to supply the scene and judges, jurors and lawyers to furnish the chorus effects, Henry W. Griffiths and Eleanor Griffiths have filled the leading roles in a divorce suit, which for flamboyant detail, rivals comic opera.

The drama began back in January, 1899, when Eleanor McMahon, the daughter of a wealthy woman well known in East Orange society, was married to the young English lover, in whom, in spite of rumors of a seal-brown past, she believed implicitly. One child, a boy, was born to them, and for eight years the sea of matrimony knew nothing by occasional squalls. At the end of that time Mr. Griffiths imported his family from Europe and with the entrance of her mother-in-law and a sister-in-law, whom she describes as a "common chorus person," into her home, Mrs. Griffiths declares harmony was banished.

Would Ruin Her. Griffiths, who is a traveling salesman for a wholesale feather and flower house on Broadway at a salary of \$10,000 a year, has likewise private fortune, his wife says, had given Mrs. Griffiths \$5,000 annually for her own and her son's maintenance.

Last January remittances suddenly ceased. She demanded the cause, was met with a sharp denial of her claims, and then began the series of plots and counter plots.

In August J. C. Mott of the Title Insurance company, her husband's brother-in-law and emissary, she says, offered her \$25,000 to get a divorce from her husband. She refused the bribe. Griffiths himself, she declares, threatened her ruin and that of her son should she refuse.

South Dakota Scene.

Mrs. Griffiths' reply was to swear out a warrant for her husband's arrest on the charge of abandonment and non-support.

Three summonses, in rapid succession, have been served upon her in the suit for divorce, on charges of abandonment, brought by Griffiths in the courts of Lincoln county, South Dakota. "What am I going to do about it?" said Mrs. Griffiths today. "I shall make no answer to the suit. Mr. Griffiths is no more a resident of South Dakota than I am. I shall prosecute Mr. Griffiths to the bitter end for the sake of my son. He said he would ruin me. I propose to turn the tables and ruin him."

### FIVE AFLAME AT PARTY BY ALCOHOL EXPLOSION

Journal Special Service. Mt. Vernon, N. Y., Sept. 20.—News has reached here that five people were seriously burned at the home of John V. Schaefer, a wealthy New York contractor, who lives at Pleasantville. Those burned were: Mrs. Schaefer, her two children, her mother and her sister-in-law, Miss Schaefer. A children's party was being held on the lawn when the accident occurred. Mrs. Schaefer was making fudge for the little ones in a large chafing dish, which was on a table on the veranda. When the confection was about half done the alcohol became exhausted, and Mrs. Schaefer sent her sister-in-law to get a bottle of the fluid from a nearby closet. As the women were pouring the alcohol into the lamp a sudden gust of wind blew the flame into the bottle, and both the bottle and lamp exploded with a terrific report, scattering burning alcohol over their clothing and the children who had gathered to eat the candy.

### ODD FELLOWS MEET IN ANNUAL CONCLAVE
