TAX LIST RAISED, HETTY QUITS TOWN

Increase of \$2,000 Causes Richest Woman to Desert Bellows Falls.

Bellows Falls, Vt., Sept. 21.—Hetty Green, the star resident of Bellows Falls, is about to leave the town.

It will mean that every possible hope of any benefit from the immense fortune of Mrs. Green in the way of a hospital, library or other similar memorial, will be cut off forever. All this thru a paltry raise in Mrs. Green's list. Mrs. Green, a woman of millions, seriously objects to being taxed. Obligated to declare her residence at some point, she has decided to select Bellows Falls and her tax career here has been unique.

Submitted Own List.
Yearly she submits her list. Sometimes it is for \$10,000 and at times when she is in a particularly generous mood, it is for \$100,000. The board of listers accept the list gratefully and for years both Mrs. Green and the listers have been apparently satisfied.

This year there was a change. The quadrennial appraisal was on and the board of listers decided to make a record. They did and up went the town fund list nearly a million dollars. Mrs. Green was caught. The increase was slight, but in her eyes important. She made a vigorous protest and so did 42 others, Bellows Falls citizens who desired to be in Mrs. Green's class.

Going to Be a Funeral.
For three days the board heard complaints, Mrs. Green appearing in person and in picturesque language denouncing the attempt to impoverish her. Yesterday the board decided against her and she immediately began preparations to leave the place. Seen by a newspaper representative, she said:

"You may say that it is not the end of the affair. When I fight there is usually a funeral and it isn't mine, either. It may be an act of Providence. It shows me that the people of Bellows Falls do not want me here any longer and perhaps it is just as well. I wish to be let alone. I come here after a hard year's work in New York and want to rest. It isn't the \$2,000 that I object to, for that is a mere pittance. It is the worry and the trouble such a small amount even causes that I object to."

DEMOCRATS LINED UP TO TURN DOWN HEARST

New York, Sept. 21.—Timothy P. Sullivan, who, with his associates, holds the balance of power in the present factional fight within Tammany Hall, says that under no circumstances would he support William R. Hearst for the democratic nomination for governor. The Murphy leaders have not said anything in behalf of the independence league man since the primaries. New York, Brooklyn and Buffalo will be lined up solidly against Hearst, according to the best information.

Interest in the state convention was stimulated by the issuance of a vigorous call bearing the caption "Sulzer and Adams" signed by the allied democratic clubs, societies and organizations of the state of New York, including the Bryan Democratic league, composed of many of the most influential men of the city.

The document deals with Hearst's ambition in red-hot phraseology.

PLOTTED TO SLAY DIAZ

Bold Conspiracy of Mexican Rebels Revealed at Hearing.

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 21.—The hearing

in the cases of the alleged Mexican revolutionists at Douglas, Ariz., developed a plot to take Cananea, capture Colonel W. C. Green's arms, and with these and the soldiers at Cananea, whom the revolutionists hoped to convert, to begin their march on the Mexican capital to "execute the tyrant Diaz."

These and other sensational features were brought out before United States Commissioner E. A. Sames at Douglas. All letters taken from the prisoners were made public and they contain threats against the head of the Mexican nation and plots for his assassination.

OLDEST HARVARD MAN DEAD.
Boston, Sept. 21.—John Torrey Morse, the oldest graduate of Harvard university and sole survivor of the class of 1832, is dead, aged 82. Mr. Morse is survived by three sons, E. Hollis Morse, a New York banker; Charles Torrey Morse of Beverly, and John Torrey Morse, Jr., the biographer and historian.

AQUITTED OF PEONAGE.
Cape Girardeau, Mo., Sept. 21.—Rex Smith and James E. Smith, who have been on trial here on a charge of peonage, have been acquitted of any complicity in the conspiracy to deprive about forty negroes of their rights. Judge Pollock charged the jury to find the other seven defendants guilty if they thought the evidence sufficient to indicate that they had conspired against the negroes.
