SILER HITS BACK AT NOLAN WITH BIG DAMAGE SUIT

SILER SUES FOR HEAVY DAMAGES

Referee Gets After the Noisy Nolan and the Battered Nelson.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—George Siler, who refereed the famous Gans-Nelson fight at Goldfield, returned from the west yesterday and immediately filed a \$50,000 suit against Batling Nelson and his manager, Billy Nolan, for defamation of character.

Just before this two deputy sheriffs stopped Nelson's boxing exhibitions. Just who is back of the stopping of the boxing is not known, but it is believed to be spite work on the part of some of Bat's enemies.

Ever since the famous fight at Goldfield and the awarding of the decision to Gans in the forty-second round by Referee Siler, both Nelson and Nolan have taken every opportunity to attack Siler.

Siler has spent the time since the fight in the west and has not been able to take any active steps against the two maulers.


