3 GREAT SHIPS ARE LAUNCHED

New Cruiser, Big Cunarder and White Star Liner, to Enter Water Today.

London, Sept. 21.—Three Leviathans were launched from various shipyards in Great Britain yesterday. They are the M. S. Shannon, the largest armed cruiser in the world; the Mauretania, the new Cunarder, a sister ship of the turbine steamer Lusitania, and the White Star liner Adriatic, which, next to the two Cunarders, is the largest ship afloat.
