

BOTH SIDES HOLD OUT AT WINNEPEG

Contractors Likely to Unite in Importing Labor to Defeat Ends of Strikers.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 21.—The strike situation in the building trades remains practically unchanged, and there is a growing dissatisfaction in business circles because of the injury to trade at a season of the year when commerce in Winnipeg is usually at its height. It is believed an organized effort will be made by the contractors to import labor, as the rapid approach of winter is creating consternation among those who own buildings in course of construction.

There is a big depletion of the laboring ranks owing to the industrial activity in the new provinces and British Columbia. There is, however, a building strike in both Calgary and Edmonton, much on the same lines as in Winnipeg. In Calgary the carpenters are out and in Edmonton all building trades quit work in sympathy with laborers who want more money.

It is felt in Winnipeg that the promise of the committee of builders to do all in its power to impress on the plumbers the necessity of arbitration is somewhat of a subterfuge, for it is generally considered that the task of convincing the master plumbers that such a step is desirable, would be a difficult one.

The master plumbers who have refused to deal with the men are wealthy and declare that they are quite satisfied to let their work stand unfinished so long as they defeat the movement, and they are believed to be in a financial position to carry out their threat.

There is not much excitement in the city. The men remain principally at the Trades hall, where the various unions hold their meetings. There will be endless and expensive litigation over the strike. Vast quantities of material is being delivered, with not a workman to take it away or attend to it in any manner. In some cases the contractors are being penalized to have buildings finished by a certain date. The strike has knocked out all calculations and owners will sue the contractors.

One striking example is that of the new Winnipeg theater, which C. P. Walker had announced would open Nov. 1. Tons of material and furnishings are being delivered daily and left lying in the open, and the loss will be heavy. This condition of affairs rules in a lesser degree in the cases of scores of other buildings.

ST. CLOUD'S MAYOR WILL FIGHT BACK

Liquor Interests in Solid Array Behind Robinson—Delay Is Hoped for.

St. Cloud, Minn., Sept. 21.—Mayor Robinson announces that he will fight the action brought by Attorney General Young in the district court in this county, charging him with maintaining in office for allowing saloons to violate the Sunday-closing law. The defense will be conducted by Judge Theodor Bruener.

What the line of defense will be is not divulged, but the mayor will have the active support of the liquor interests in the contest. The defense, it is understood, hopes to be able to keep the matter in court until after the mayor's term has expired. Mayor Robinson is a candidate for state senator on the democratic ticket in this district and will, if elected, resign as mayor.

The Sunday-closing movement has never been popular in this city. When ever the issue was fairly presented at any election those opposed to Sunday closing have always won.

W. L. Sartell is the republican opponent of Mayor Robinson for the state senate, and the Sunday-closing movement will naturally be made an issue in the campaign, with the result that a strong fight will be made for the mayor by those who are in sympathy with his policy.

DYNAMITE BLAST IS FATAL TO 5 LABORERS

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 21.—Word was received last night of another terrible dynamite explosion on the right of way of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, near Finmark, New Ontario, yesterday afternoon, in which five were killed outright and six others injured, one of whom is expected to die.

JOHN LUDWIG DEAD

Prominent Democrat and Pioneer Expires at His Winona Home.

Winona, Minn., Sept. 21.—John Ludwig, a prominent German-American resident of Winona, an well known to Luxemburgers throughout the United States, died today from diabetes. He was several times mayor of Winona, and was general on the staff of Governor Lind and ran for state treasurer once on the democratic ticket. He was appointed last winter to succeed H. W. Lamberton, deceased, on the state canal commission. Bishop Cotter will conduct the funeral services Sunday afternoon. Mr. Ludwig was the father of Mrs. George T. Simpson of St. Paul, wife of the first assistant attorney general.
