Judge Hallam of the St. Paul district court has filed an opinion denying the motion of Dr. T. E. Appleby for a new trial in the case involving the legality of the will of the late Mrs. Cornelia Day Wilder Appleby, who left a great part of her estate for charitable purposes in St. Paul.

The bones of a human forearm were found in a yard in the rear of 1409 Vine place yesterday, and were turned over to the health department. The matter was referred to Dr. Frank Corbett of the health department. He thinks the arm was amputated at some time and had been buried in the yard.

John Deyken, 15 years of age, residing at Hastings and Earl streets, St. Paul, accidentally shot himself thru the left foot yesterday afternoon, splintering the bones. Deyken was examining a revolver belonging to his father, preparatory to a hunting trip which he had planned with several other boys.

Julius Witterstoff of Highwood, St. Paul, had his right arm nearly torn off Wednesday. His sleeve caught in the wheel and belting of a threshing machine near Hazel Park. He was hurried to St. Joseph hospital, St. Paul, where it is feared amputation will ultimately be necessary.

The traveling exhibit of the National Anti-Tuberculosis association will be shown in the twin cities in the near future. Secretary H. M. Brackley of the board of health succeeded in making arrangements while in the east recently. The exhibit will be shown ten days in each city.

Lightning struck the Mount Park, St. Paul, school yesterday. The bolt entered the roof, and bored a hole down to the basement. Miss Mary Z. Dallas, principal, was slightly stunned. The lightning played about the walls and frightened teachers and pupils. In the kindergarten the children became panic-stricken and ran for the exits. It was near the noon hour, and school was dismissed following the incident.

## SHATTUCK CADETS LEAD IN SHOOTING

### RIFLE TEAM MAKES HIGHEST TARGET SCORE.

Contest Conducted by War Department with Twelve Schools and Universities Competing, Results in Victory for Minnesota Boys, and Place Among Six Highest, in Military Efficiency.

In competition with the rifle teams of eleven other colleges and schools situated in all parts of the United States, Shattuck military school, Faribault, has carried off first honors and is ranked first on the records of the war department. This fact, together with the announcement by the general staff of the war department that Shattuck is officially ranked among the first six schools in the country after an inspection of all the military schools in the country, places the Minnesota institution on a military standpoint, in the first rank among schools and colleges. Shattuck alumni are rejoicing at the prestige won by the Shattuck cadets.

Schools That Enlisted.

In the intercollegiate rifle shoot recently held in San Francisco, teams from four military schools and eight universities were entered. The entry list included Cornell university, Nevada state university, State College of Washington, Iowa state university, California state university, Florida state university, Tennessee state university, Mississippi college, and mechanical college, Wentworth military academy, West Texas military academy, Michigan military academy and Shattuck school. The meet was conducted by Captain George E. Sage, U. S. A., retired.

Shattuck finished first with a score of 403. California university, Shattuck's nearest competitor, finished with a score of 387. The Shattuck rifle team, which is a preparatory school and that in this competition it won from expert teams of eight universities, is highly ranked among the first six schools in the country after an inspection of all the military schools in the country, places the Minnesota institution on a military standpoint, in the first rank among schools and colleges.

Value as Soldiers.

In an effort to ascertain just what might be expected from the schools and colleges of the United States in times of war, the government last spring decided to introduce an official inspection system and to inspect and classify the schools and colleges of the country from a standpoint of military efficiency. The list of preparatory schools, with their gradings as determined by the war department, has just been announced and the Shattuck corps ranks among a list of six designated as being the best instructed and making the best showing.

By law of congress each of the six schools ranking first is given permission to nominate an honor graduate for examination for an appointment as second lieutenant in the United States army and a member of the 1906 class at Shattuck is now preparing himself for examination according to the war department regulations.

New Gym Building.

One of the most complete gymnasium buildings in the country is now under process of construction at Shattuck, and when the building is constructed Shattuck authorities and students look for an increased prestige in the preparatory school and athletic department. Shattuck always strong in athletics, needed only a good gymnasium to be considered one of the best athletically equipped schools in the country and the athletic department of the school will be expected to push the military department hard for honors.

The gymnasium being built at Shattuck was designed by Cass Gilbert, architect, and it is planned not only to embrace the most complete facilities for indoor training, but the general office of the school as well. The first floor will be located a large and completely equipped gymnasium with dressing rooms and all necessary appurtenances, together with the general offices of the school.

In the basement there will be a sixty-foot swimming pool supplied with running water and surrounded on all sides by an elevated platform. In connection with the pool there will be shower baths.

Work on the building is progressing rapidly and it will soon be ready for occupancy.

### EMINENT SURGEON HERE

Dr. W. W. Keen, Noted Medical Author, Staying in Minneapolis.

Dr. William Williams Keen of Philadelphia is a distinguished visitor in Minneapolis, the guest of J. B. Gilfillan.

Dr. Keen is an author of repute, particularly along medical and surgical lines. He has served several times as lecturer at Jefferson Medical college, and elsewhere, and has been a trustee and fellow of Brown university since 1878.

He is corresponding member of notable foreign medical societies, as well as active in the leading American organizations. Much of Dr. Keen's reputation hangs upon his eminent contributions of new ideas in surgical practice.

### OUTS OUT "DENKY" CARS

The St. Paul assembly last evening passed a resolution requiring the street railway company to route its "Denky" cars over the Union station loop in St. Paul. If this is done, the Union station loop cars may be withdrawn. This will give a tremendous relief to the station, and do away with the little old cars which have been making the depot loop circuit. It is understood the street railway company approves of this change.

Butler Capron, the "newsboy," who is a familiar figure to everyone who passes the A. D. F. corner at Fourth street and Nicollet avenue, has taken his annual flight to Los Angeles. There he will sell papers and pencils all winter and again, like a bird of passage, will return for the summer in Minneapolis.

Butler Capron is an example of what can be done to overcome misfortune. Thirty-eight years ago, when about 8 years old, he was run over by the steam cars in such a way that his legs had to be amputated at the thighs. The success of the dangerous operation is a tribute to early day surgery in Minneapolis.

When he recovered Butler continued his schooling and was an attendant at the old Washington school, where the courthouse now stands, with A. D. Thompson, Dr. Fred Baldwin, E. C. Gale, George Bell and other well-known names.

Capron has always supported himself and for years has sold papers on the streets. A. D. Thompson, proprietor of the drug stores at Fourth and Nicollet and at Third street and First street, regrets the departure of Capron and would like to see two men like him at his corners.

According to Mr. Thompson, "yappers" never encroach on the territory of Capron. While Capron was on the corner, the neighborhood was never disturbed by the cries of "yappers" and Mr. Thompson believes that if he could get two fellows like his old Washington schoolmate to preempt both corners it would be a benefit to the neighborhood.
