Railroads

MILWAUKEE WILL LOCATE NEW TOWNS

Seventy Stations Will Be Established Between Everts and Butte on Coast Extension.

 Butte, Mont., Sept. 26.—Along the 731 miles of the survey route of the Milwaukee road, between Everts, S. D., and Butte, Mont., will be scattered more than seventy stations, a majority of which will be at new locations, either where there already is a town established, or where the company expects one to spring up with the advent of the road.

The country to be opened by this new road is good one, especially in Montana, probably more fertile than any thru which the road will pass on its way to the coast. The route thru Montana is far from any of the other lines of railroad and passes thru a section which long has been famous for its fertility and wealth of natural resources.

It is estimated that when the road is built a new town will be established about every ten miles. Some of these doubtless will remain only stations, but with the development of irrigation projects now being undertaken by the federal government, and by private corporations, and the vast increase in population which is bound to come with the building of the new road, many of the towns to be established along the Milwaukee line will develop into commercial centers of importance.

It is understood that the road is making arrangements to advertise extensively the resources of the territory thru which its Pacific coast extension will pass.

ALPHABET ACTIVITY

Minnesota Road Asks for Bids for Stations.

 Albert Lea, Minn., Sept. 26.—Contractors have been asked to submit bids for the construction of several station buildings along the line of the new "Alphabet" road.

Grading is said to be progressing rapidly and it is expected that work on this end of the line will be completed by Oct. 15, altho bad weather may cause some delay. Most of the grading is within a few miles of St. Clair has been finished and ties and rails are on the ground and track laying can proceed at a rapid rate.

Officers of the road predict that the line will be in operation by the first of the year.

PUSHES INTO WINNIPEG

Contractors Ready to Move 800 Buildings for Great Northern.

 Warroad, Minn., Sept. 26.—Neil & Moody of this place have secured the contract for clearing the Great Northern right of way into Winnipeg and work is expected to be started within a few weeks. This contract involves the moving of nearly 800 buildings, among which are some large wholesale structures.

SHORT OUT FINISHED

Canadian Northern Avoids Long Haul Thru Winnipeg.

 Hallock, Minn., Sept. 26.—The first train has been run over the new extension of the Canadian Northern road from Emerson to Sprague. The road parallels the boundary and makes it possible to make shipments from Emerson and points south to Warroad and points on the Canadian Northern there, without routing them thru Winnipeg. This makes a saving of seventy-three miles in the haul and avoids the long delay which was encountered at the Winnipeg transfer station.

RAILROAD NOTES.

Plans are being made for the fall revival of the St. Paul Transportation Bowling league, and a meeting will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday at 276 Robert street.

The Chicago Great Western has announced a series of "Home" excursions to points on its line from Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas and the eastern part of Kansas. Tickets will be on sale Oct. 9, 23 and Nov. 13 and 27. The return limit will be thirty days.

The Great Northern and the Northern Pacific roads have issued a joint passenger tariff covering a one-way trip trans-Pacific and around-the-world rates by way of the Great Northern Steamship company, Boston Steamship company and Nippon Yusen Kaisha. Thirty-six tours are outlined. The round-the-world rates vary from \$400 to \$700.

ENQUIRER FOR LONGWORTH

John B. McLean's Democratic Paper Praises President's Son-in-Law.

 Cincinnati, Sept. 26.—John B. McLean's Cincinnati Enquirer, chief democratic organ of Ohio, in its leading editorial indorses the candidacy for congress of Nicholas Longworth, republican, and son-in-law of President Roosevelt.

The editorial commends Mr. Longworth's record in the house and adds: "In his own party Longworth sweeps everything and the democrats say 'Gosh, he deserves it.'"

"The electors in November will only record a foregone conclusion. Wouldn't it be a good thing to make it unanimous? Would there be any use in making an opposing nomination? Why not remove the party bans and give the people of Cincinnati a chance to spread themselves?"

THIS HEN IS THE CHAMPION

Virginia Man Proud of Biddy that Breaks Egg Record.

 Washington, Sept. 26.—The proud owner of a hen, which he believes has broken the world's record for laying eggs has just written to the Bureau of Animal Industry of the department of agriculture. E. W. Starnell of Alexandria, Va., is the possessor of this remarkable specimen of poultry. He informs the bureau of animal industry that since Oct. 5, 1905, the hen has laid 291 eggs. When he was up he calculates she will have laid over 300 eggs. Exclusive of the molting season, this is at the rate of one egg every twenty-five hours.

Mr. Starnell does not record that there is anything seemingly abnormal about his hen save that she is a model of energy and industry.
