**IOWA CITY, IOWA.**—Chester Park, a suburb of Iowa city, and pavilion, and all its contents were destroyed by fire this morning. The loss is \$4,000, partly covered by insurance.

**MARQUETTE, MICH.**—While drawing his weapon after a deer thru a fence while hunting, John Hendricks of Northern Michigan was fatally shot himself with a rifle and is fatally injured.

**NORTHWEST NECROLOGIC**

# CHILDREN'S HOME CHARGES DENIED

## SHERARD WILL RETALIATE ON INSTITUTION'S SLANDERERS.

**Allegations that the Home Has Imported Boys Who Afterwards Became Criminals and State Charges Are Shown to Be False by the Superintendent at Sioux Falls.**

Sioux Falls, S. D., Sept. 26.—The officials and those interested in the work of the South Dakota Children's home in this city have been aroused to a high state of indignation by a sensational article which gained circulation in the daily and weekly press and reads as follows: "Five of the Sioux Falls Children's home boys are inmates of the reform school at Plankinton. These five criminals were imported into the state from the east and turned loose upon our society. Each one now costs this state \$1,000 a year. In ten years the five will cost \$10,000. Let's see; did not this country appropriate \$400 to the concern to assist in the care of the five boys referred to as higher than warranted even by the figures given as the estimated cost per year. The cost of caring for the boys for ten years, even if the cost of each was \$1,000 a year, would be only \$80,000 instead of half a million dollars, as stated in the item."

**Sherard Denies.**  
Superintendent Sherard of the Children's home, whose attention was called to the item, says there is not in the reform school a child who was brought into South Dakota by the Children's home authorities.

He further states that in the past five years only one child has been brought into South Dakota from another state by the authorities of the Children's home.

It will be noted that the estimated cost of the care of the five boys referred to as higher than warranted even by the figures given as the estimated cost per year. **LEWISTON, MONT.**—Pete Wells pleaded guilty to horse stealing and was sentenced to two and one-half years in the state penitentiary.

**WEBSTER CITY, IOWA.**—The man killed by a North-Western train has been identified as Austin Kidder of this city. He lived with his widow mother.

**MAYNARD, IOWA.**—The 2-year-old daughter of Harry T. Smith lived only two hours after she was discovered with her clothing in flames. It is supposed she had been playing with matches.

Insurance Company Sues Papers.  
The Queen City Fire Insurance company of Sioux Falls has instituted a suit against the Denver Post by which the company seeks to recover \$25,000. The suit is based upon the fact that the Denver paper placed the Sioux Falls company on its blacklist on the allegation that the company was paying only 60 cents on the dollar on its San Francisco losses.

The officers of the company say it is paying 100 cents on the dollar on the San Francisco losses, as they are adjusted. Altho the company was organized only a short time before the San Francisco disaster, it already has paid out about \$130,000 on these losses, and is paying the others as rapidly as they are adjusted.

**McHENRY NEEDS A COURTHOUSE**  
Proposed Bond Issue Will Be Submitted to the Voters.

TOWNER, N. D.—From present indications McHenry will have a new courthouse. Bonds in the sum of \$50,000 for this purpose will be voted upon at the general election this fall. The county has been without a courthouse for nearly two years and the people are beginning to realize that a building is absolutely necessary.

Contractor Alex Nelson is putting the finishing touches on the new city hall. The building is a three-story cement structure and will cost something over \$5,000.
