HAMMOND WILL MEET McCLEARY

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE IS READY TO DEBATE.

Revision of the Tariff, He Insists, Shall Be the Question Under Discussion—If the Debates Are Not Arranged, Then He Is Ready to Hold Joint Meetings.

St. James, Minn., Sept. 26.—W. S. Hammond, the democratic nominee for congress from the second district, has prepared the answer to McCleary's challenge for a series of debates, has written the following letter:

"My Dear Sir: In this congressional campaign I believe nothing will occur to destroy the friendly relations which have always prevailed between us, and as it is stated in your letter of Sept. 21, I believe the respect each of us has for the other will continue. Before your letter was received or published I wrote you that inasmuch as there had been suggestions of joint debates between us I was willing, if it were agreeable to you, to arrange for four joint debates in different parts of the district upon the question 'Should the Protective Tariff Schedule Be Revised Now?' stating that I would take the affirmative of the question if you would take the negative. In that letter I also stated that if for any reason you did not wish to engage in joint debates upon that question, I would be pleased to hold four joint meetings with you, and that I would be glad to have you select the time to be equally divided between us.

"So far no arrangements for my campaign have been made that will interfere with the holding of such joint debates or joint meetings, if you desire to have them. You, of course, know better than I what your action will be in the next congress, if you are elected; but you will admit that an better qualified than I shall act in tariff legislation with such democrats as Clark of Missouri and Rainey of Illinois, and such republicans as McCall of Massachusetts and Babcock of Wisconsin, and with the representatives from this state believing in the tariff revision plank of the Duluth or the Minneapolis platform, and in other matters I shall act to the best of my judgment for the best interests of the second congressional district of Minnesota.

"From your published speeches I am led to believe that you do not favor an immediate revision of the tariff. Hence my proposal to discuss the question above stated with you. That question and that alone I am willing to debate with you. But, if not agreeable to you, I am willing to hold four joint meetings, the time to be equally divided between us, to speak upon any subject you desire and I to address myself to what I deem the issue of the campaign.

"I am writing you frankly concerning the matter so that there will be no need of a long-drawn-out public correspondence about joint debates or joint meetings. If you think best to accept either of the suggestions I have made I will either meet you personally or by a representative to arrange for the times and places for the meetings. I remain very truly yours,

"W. S. Hammond."

MICHIGAN ROADS TO FIGHT THE TAX

INJUNCTION SUIT WAS FIRST NOTE OF TROUBLE.

Wisconsin and Michigan Company Backed by Other Roads in Its Allegation that Its Assessment Was Raised Without Due Notice and Opportunity to Appear Before the Board.

The body was carried thru to Crookston by mistake.

Walsh & Tutges, attorneys for Thief River Falls, have been engaged to fight the case. The points raised are different from any known to have been set forth before a court in this state.

All doors, however, were barred against him, so that he was not able to find any persons to shoot. A few hours later the police succeeded in arresting him.

Wheeler came home from work and found that the authorities had taken in charge his father, Hiram Wheeler, and sent him to the asylum. He blamed his neighbors for making the complaint against his father. Much excitement was here as a result of Wheeler's action in demanding what he termed his rights by means of a rifle.
