SOO ROAD PLUGS FOR TWIN CITIES

HEAVY TRANSCONTINENTAL TRAFFIC MAY COME HERE.

Thru Passenger Trains, East and West-bound, Are Likely to Be Run by Way of Winnipeg or Moose Jaw, Minneapolis and Sault Ste. Marie

Plans are being discussed by the Soo line for diversion of the heavy east and west-bound transcontinental passenger traffic of the Canadian Pacific road through Minneapolis. It will probably be accomplished by the operation of thru passenger trains and a shortening of the schedule from the east.

The Soo will take the trains at the Sault Ste. Marie gateway and return them to the Canadian Pacific either at Winnipeg or at Moose Jaw. The purpose is to take the people thru a garden country in northern Wisconsin and Minnesota instead of thru 500 miles of wild waste country north of Lake Superior. It will make the route more attractive and will at the same time result in a tremendous advertisement of the twin cities.

It has come to the attention of the Commercial club that a tremendous travel of foreign tourists going thru the Canadian country is taking place every year, and that the globetrotters go to the Pacific coast without any knowledge of the existence of the twin city gateway to the northwest, and of the developing farming territory which is tributary.

Tourists are found in the Quebec, Montreal and Winnipeg hotels every summer who never heard of Minneapolis, except casually. They are landed at Quebec by the Canadian Pacific Steamship company, and other lines, and proceed leisurely across country by the Canadian Pacific railway to the Canadian Rockies and Vancouver. On the way the most interesting scenery is from Sault Ste. Marie to Winnipeg, also on the Soo line.

Owing to the relationship of the two roads it will be easy to arrange the transportation matters, and both lines will profit by the increased interest in the transcontinental route. Thru trains can be handled as easily from Sudbury to Winnipeg, or Moose Jaw, over the Soo line as over the Canadian Pacific direct, and the time from the east to Minneapolis can be easily shortened to forty hours or less.

The service can also be operated in connection with the new thru train which the Soo line will establish in the spring.

FOUR NATIONS INVOLVED

"THE GREAT SECRET" PROMISES RARE ENTERTAINMENT FOR THOUSANDS OF JOURNAL READERS.

Four great nations, America, Great Britain, Germany and France, are entangled in "The Great Secret" serial story which begins in The Sunday Magazine of the Minneapolis Journal Sunday, Sept. 30. But in this connection an old thing happened one day this month when the following cablegram appeared in many American newspapers:

GERMAN 'RAID' ON ENGLAND?

"Rumored Dash of Torpedo Boats During the Maneuvers.

"London, Sept. 12.—The Daily Mail this morning makes a sensation of a reported mimic raid by a German torpedo boat on the English coast last night in connection with the German naval maneuvers. Thirty-six torpedo boat destroyers are said to have dashed across the North sea and to have returned at high speed. It is believed that the British warships along the coast did not detect them."

The reader will find himself at once interested in "The Great Secret," and this interest never flags to the end of the story. An international spy, condemned by some hidden power to unremitting espionage and to some mysterious lingering death, arouses the sympathy of a traveling Englishman, courage by nature and courageous by nature, and also of a charming American girl, the heroine of the story, and one of its most active and delightful characters. How they foil this mysterious but seemingly all powerful and of conspirators, notwithstanding their ingenuity and resourcefulness, carries lively interest until the international conspiracy begins to unravel itself before them.

The illustrations for "The Great Secret," as well as the colored cover, an idealized portrait of the heroine of the story, are by G. D. Williams, whose social cartoon of the "Best Gift" was The Sunday Magazine success of last Christmastide.


