WANT SOLONS TO ANSWER QUERIES

SHIPPERS' ASSOCIATION SUBMITS LIST TO CANDIDATES.

Organization Will Try to Get Every Candidate for Legislature on Record as to Railroad Legislation, Also on Tax Reform and Extension of the Primary.

The Minnesota Shippers & Receivers' association, the organization which has been carrying on the fight for reduced railroad rates, is going into politics this fall, to the extent of putting candidates on record as to their stand on the railroad question and allied subjects. Members of the association have been supplied with cards containing a list of questions addressed to candidates, and they are asked to submit them to any candidates they can reach and get answers. In the circular sent out by George S. Loftus, commissioner of the association, he says that it is hoped to secure an expression from every candidate for the legislature, and the result of the inquiry will be mailed to voters all over the state, "in order to enable them to vote intelligently at the coming election."

The questions to be answered are as follows:

1. Do you favor "jail sentence" for railroad rebaters?
2. Are you in favor of reciprocal demurrage?
3. Do you believe in the principle of basing railroad rates on the actual cost of construction of the road, plus legitimate operating expenses and a fair rate of interest on this valuation of the property?
4. Are you in favor of a 2-cent passenger rate?
5. Do you favor the abolishment of free passes?
6. Do you favor the revision of the state tax laws?
7. Do you favor the extension of the primary system of selection to state officials?

Mr. Loftus has sent out another circular to members, showing what results have been accomplished since the association was organized, Dec. 6, 1904. It includes reduction of a number of rates, abolishment of extra charges, lower minimum weights, reduced classification of oil in barrels and other concessions from the railroads. Among the things secured the circular mentions the 20 per cent reduction in merchandise rates, and says:

As this concession was only secured during the past week, the new rates will of course not be in effect until the railroads have time to make up their new tariffs. They will naturally make every endeavor to delay putting these rates in effect until they have tested the legality of the order of the railroad and warehouse commission in the courts. It is our intention, however, to use every effort to force them to put the new rates in effect, at the earliest possible date and if they wish to make a test case, so after they have put the rates in effect, thus giving the shippers and receivers the benefits of the reduction while the controversy is being carried on.

FAMILY ASKS JUSTICE

RELATIVES OF H. D. STEVENSON READY TO ASSIST IN PROSECUTION OF JOHN E. LANE.

Family love is calling loudly for vengeance against John E. Lane, the alleged slayer of Henry D. Stevenson.

County Attorney Al J. Smith yesterday received a letter from H. B. Stevenson, a brother of the deceased, living at Atkinson, Wis., in which the writer inquired as to the prosecution of Lane and intimated that the family would spare neither money nor effort in bringing their relative's slayer to justice. He expressed a desire to be kept informed as to the progress made by the county attorney, and as to what, if anything, he could do to assist the state.

Lane is now waiting trial on an indictment charging him with manslaughter in the first degree. His case is set for Wednesday, Oct. 3, owing to the large number of other cases on the calendar, it cannot be reached next week. Mr. Smith has said, however, that he would use every effort to bring the case to trial at the earliest possible date. The defendant is accused of striking Henry D. Stevenson, an elderly man, and knocking him into the street, as an outcome of a dispute. The fall resulted in a fractured skull, from which Stevenson died a few days later.

Western Avenue Association Secures Improved Streetcar Service.

The Western Avenue Improvement association met last evening at the home of O. M. Farmer, 2306 Western avenue, for the semi-annual meeting and election of officers for the coming six months. A. C. Kaufman, vice president, was elected president. F. C. Smith was elected vice president and C. A. Bunyan, secretary and treasurer. Mr. Kaufman reported the result of his interview with the street railway company, which resulted in better service on the Western avenue line, and the club voted that a letter of thanks be sent to the company.

Announcement was made by A. F. Irving of a meeting at his home, 402 Irving avenue N, for next Monday evening, when a club will be organized for the pushing of the campaign, and especially doing what can be done to secure the re-election of Mayor D. P. Jones.

BRITONS FORM SOCIETY

"Sons of the British Empire" Talk Banquets for Laurier and Hill.

A society of men born under the British flag was organized in the parlors of the St. Paul Commercial club last evening. The name, "Sons of the British Empire," was adopted. There were fifty members present last evening, but 270 have signified their intention of joining. The society decided to give two banquets at some future date, one to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, and the other to James J. Hill, a Canadian by birth.


