


AMATEUR AUTOISTS SHOW SOME SPEED

Minneapolis Automobile Club Holds Successful Race Meet on Hamline Track.

Much amateur driving of the first-class was shown this afternoon by spectators who watched the races pulled off at Hamline track by the Minneapolis Automobile club yesterday afternoon.

Then came the fireworks. Beckwith took the lead in the three-mile race, and won by about seven-fifths of a mile.

Equally sensational was the finish of Ernie Simpson in the second heat of the three-mile race for multiple-cylinder cars.

Owing to a misunderstanding of the terms of the contest this event was the cause of the only contested decision of the day.

The first event to be called was No. 1 on the program, the two-mile race for runabouts.

The challenge handicap between the Franklin and Ford runabouts was spectacular. By the terms of the contest the Ford was to have one-eighth of a mile start.

George Murphy again drove C. C. Evans' Mitchell to victory in the three-mile challenge race.

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WALTER CAMP STILL TALKING, TALKING

Football Rules Require Wind-Gage and Plumb Line Interpretation.

New York Herald Special Service. New York, Sept. 29.—Walter Camp of Yale, who presided at the conference of "interpretation" held at the instance of the central board of officials of the American Intercollegiate football rules committee, which was attended by more than 100 coaches, officials and prominent football players from the large universities, today gave out an official statement regarding the results of the discussion.

Mr. Camp's statement shows that only a few of the problems are to be passed on by the rules committee, and that the most important rule they will have to make a clear interpretation of is the new one which requires any one of the five center line men who drops the ball in a play to drop back five yards.

Under rule 22, the committee is also asked to amend so as to include striking a man, (whether he has the ball or not), with the heel of his hand.

These were merely his interpretations of the rules, but the paper met with such general favor that James A. Babbit of Haverford, chairman of the central board, has asked Mr. Camp to revise it slightly and have it submitted to the rules committee for approval.
