DIVORCE RUMORS 'LIES,' PLATT SAYS

Aged Senator Denies Break with Young Wife—Actress and Coachman Figure.

New York, Oct. 2.—That the papers in Mrs. Thomas Collier Platt's suit for divorce were served last week upon the senator is positively stated by those in a position to know the truth. The actress who it is believed will figure in the case is invisible to callers at her city home. A close friend made the following statement: "The vaudeville actress indicated in Mrs. Platt's back-fire against the senator is a godchild of Senator Platt's. Her mother was Senator Platt's school friend and her father was the senator's lifelong friend."

"The first wife of Senator Platt took a great interest in the social and professional career of their godchild. Both before and after the young woman's marriage she was often at Mrs. Platt's home. Her husband has been numbered among the close friends of the senator for years."

"Pack of Lies," He Says. "The senator's marriage to Mrs. Janeway was followed by the estrangement of many of his relatives and friends, among them the young woman in question. The new Mrs. Platt was ever her enemy. Prompt and drastic action will be taken by her if any further publicity be given to her by the senator's wife."

Almost hysterical, the aged senator, waving back would-be questioners that pressed about him as he passed from the Hotel Gotham to his waiting carriage, cried: "The story is a pack of lies. I'll make a statement later."

At the same hour Mrs. Platt, as she boarded a New York train at the Highland Mills station, turned angrily upon her questioners and said: "There is no truth in the story of an estrangement between the senator and myself. It is all the work of that wretch, Carmody, who swore revenge when I took my daughter from him. I am going now to my husband. We have just been talking over the phone."

Mrs. Platt came to the city and made a fruitless attempt to see the senator. He refused to consent to a meeting and the angry woman returned to Highland Hills.

Carmody a Principal. "Colonel" Francis J. Carmody's name figures prominently in the stories in circulation here. It is declared that he has threatened to drag out the Platt family skeleton as the result of his conviction that Mrs. Platt is responsible for the troubles between himself and his wife, the daughter of Mrs. Platt.

Carmody is said to have objected to Mrs. Platt's alleged friendliness to her coachman, Hedges, and won her ill-will. For this reason she is said to have brought about the parting of the Carmodys.

Carmody is well known in Minneapolis thru his connection with former Congressman Fletcher, as secretary, and also as a brilliantly uniformed "colonel" on the governor's staff.

COACHMAN FIGURES IN CASE Hedges Treated as Equal by Mrs. Platt, Says Denver Report.

Journal Special Service. Denver, Oct. 2.—The upheaval in eastern society following the report that serious trouble is brewing between Senator Thomas C. Platt and his dashing young wife, over the reputed attentions accepted by Mrs. Platt from J. K. Hedges, former coachman, recalls the fact that when the Platts and party were in Denver last September more than passing comment was aroused among those who had a chance to observe by the obvious desire of Hedges, who made one of the party, to be with the wife of the aged New York senator and her willingness to receive his graceful attentions.

Hedges was introduced simply as "Mr. Hedges," and no explanation was made to any of those presented as to his standing in the party. A party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Platt and their friends went over the Moffat road in a special car.

Many of those who saw the party here frankly commented upon Hedges' attentions to Mrs. Platt. Hedges was a great favorite with the ladies of the party, who seemed to treat him in every way as an equal, or at least, were very careful of his feelings. They never issued orders to him, but seemed always eager to provide for his comfort as if he were an honored guest.

DISCOVERS THE CAUSE OF 'SLEEPING SICKNESS' Ann Arbor, Mich., Oct. 2.—After three months' work Professor Frederick G. Novy of the University of Michigan has discovered the cause of "sleeping fever," a disease which annually carries off thousands in India and South America.

Drowsiness with a high intermittent fever seizes the victims and they go into a sleep from which they never awaken. There have been only two known cases in the United States, one in San Francisco and one this summer at Governor's island. Professor Novy heard about the New York case and went to Governor's island to investigate.

He brought back with him some of the blood of the patient with a view to finding the bacteria. Tests were at once made to find some medium upon which the bacteria would propagate. Over 200 different mediums were tried before anything could be found upon which it would thrive. It was finally discovered that it would grow in a mixture of blood, agar and glucose. Now he has found the cause, but not the cure.

He will immediately begin work in an attempt to find an antitoxin that will destroy the poison which is thrown off by the bacteria, and an anti-bacteria serum that will kill the bacteria itself.

CHIEF OF MORMONS NAMED IN WARRANT

Joseph Smith Arrested, Charged with Living with Five Wives.

Salt Lake City, Oct. 2.—The president of the Mormon church, Joseph Smith, has been arrested on the charge of living illegally with five wives. The complaint was sworn to by a Mormon deputy sheriff, the warrant was issued by order of a Mormon sheriff, and the committing magistrate is also a Mormon. President Smith was arraigned immediately after his arrest and waived preliminary hearing. He was bound over and released on his own recognizance.

President Smith reached here two days ago on his return from Europe. He then learned that an attempt had been made to secure his arrest for a statutory crime in connection with the birth of his forty-third child. The complaint was made from a distinctly anti-Mormon source.

Refused to Prosecute. The county attorney refused to approve a prosecution on this charge. The attorney was then cited to appear in court and show cause why he should not be compelled to act in the matter. After the hearing the court held that the attorney was justified in refusing to prosecute, because the complainant offered no evidence that the mother of the child was not the wife of President Smith.

Whatever the motive back of the last proceedings, the effect will be to disarm the criticism that has been directed against the authorities for their failure to take cognizance of the admissions made by President Smith before the senate committee during the late investigation of the Smoot case.

FARMER IS KILLED Head Is Caught in Thresher Flywheel and Crushed.

WATERLOO, IOWA.—Charles Townsend, a farmer near Blairfield, while driving a thresher engine yesterday, was caught in the flywheel, which crushed his head, killing him instantly. The engine had been started and he went to investigate, when the accident happened. He leaves a wife.
