LOANS TO SCHOOLS

State Board Passes Out \$53,050 to Be Used for Buildings.

The state board of investment has authorized twenty-six loans to school districts from the permanent school fund, amounting in all to \$53,050. One loan of \$15,000 was made to the school district at Biwabik, and another for \$15,000 to Chisholm, both on the iron range.
