**BRYAN DISCUSSES
NEW YORK BATTLE**

Prepares Labored Defense of Hearst for the Forthcoming "Commoner."

Special to The Journal.

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 5.—In the forthcoming issue of his Commoner, William J. Bryan will make a somewhat labored defense of the candidacy of W. R. Hearst. Mr. Bryan insists the contest in New York is not between men, but on the question of state government. In conclusion he praises the fealty of Hearst to him (Bryan) in 1896. Mr. Bryan says:

"The New York gubernatorial contest will not be a sham battle. It will be a spirited fight. The personality of both candidates is such as to command the most faithful support on the part of lieutenants who delight to follow men whose love for battle runs in the blood, while in the public record of each candidate there is inspiration for the rank and file. He is upon securing the best results in the management of public affairs.

"The much may be said in Mr. Hughes' favor as a lawyer and a citizen, he will support for government, or be judged by the purposes of the powerful interests that are even now rushing to his support and whose representatives display such fine frenzy whenever the candidacy of William R. Hearst is mentioned.

Corporation Question.

"The people of New York will learn long before the close of the campaign that this contest is not between Hughes and Hearst. The question is, shall the affairs of New York state government be administered for the public benefit or with an eye toward the interests of the public interests? Shall insurance companies and other special interests exercise a controlling voice in public affairs, or shall those interests now prevailing mercilessly upon the people and practically without hindrance from the authorities be brought within the lash of the law?

"In 1896, when loyally to the party was tested, William R. Hearst supported the ticket most heartily. The democrats of New York, who have no ax to grind and who are interested solely in the public welfare, should support the democratic state ticket headed by William R. Hearst."

TOWNE OPPOSES HEARST

Congressman Will Stump State Against Nominee of Democrats.

Washington, Oct. 5.—Representative Charles A. Towne of New York, formerly representative and for two months a senator from Minnesota, proposes to stump the state of New York against the Hearst ticket in the coming election. He made a statement in this city.

"Mr. Towne does not regard Hearst as a candidate of the democracy," said Mr. Slater, in commenting on this statement. "He considers that the methods pursued by Hearst in securing the gubernatorial nomination were such as not to entitle him to any consideration from the democracy."

The announcement made by Mr. Towne has occasioned much surprise here because of his close relations with William Jennings Bryan. The attitude assumed by Mr. Towne is regarded as indicating a coming estrangement between himself and Mr. Bryan.

**AYLWARD SPEAKS
AT MILWAUKEE**

Democratic Candidate for Governor Opens Campaign in the Lake City.

Milwaukee, Oct. 5.—The Milwaukee opening of the democratic campaign with a speech by John A. Aylward last night was a combination of a mad cheering of the name and policies of Bryan with a careful plea for the votes of republicans both of the stalwart and La Follette tendency. The speaker, the democratic candidate for governor said that the La Follette administration had spent three times as much money as any previous administration and most of it was wasted. To secure votes of La Follette, however, he added the charge that the republican party was now once more in the hands of the stalwarts. He said:

"The people are awakening to the true situation and to a realization of their rights and power. They insist on the basic principle of the democratic party, and the remedies proposed are: "First—To subject, regulate and control the railways and other transportation companies, to prevent excessive charges, rebates and discriminations so that as our platform says they shall be operated for the benefit of the people for whom they were intended.

"Second—To revise the tariff and reduce it to a revenue basis to the end that it shall not shelter or foster trusts or monopolies.

"Third—To control, regulate and subject, and if needed, to buy and operate the different municipal public service corporations.

"Fourth—To destroy special class legislation and inaugurate rule of equal rights to all and special privileges to none."

"Fifth—To establish a uniform and equitable distribution of the burdens of taxation."

Francis E. McGovern will enter the race for district attorney as an independent candidate.

SIoux FALLS, S. D.—Something of a sensation has been created in Gregory by the arrest of Frank Kinzie, a well-known character. Being thirteen miles northwest of the village of Burke, on the charge of cattle rustling. Kinzie was taken before Judge Jury of Burke for his preliminary examination, but before the case was continued for thirty days and the defendant was required to furnish a bond in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at that time. He stoutly maintains his innocence.
