### FEARING A PANIC, HE ASKS NEW LAW

Senator Spooner Urges Necessity of Action Relative to Currency.

Washington, Oct. 12.—Necessity of a law that will give elasticity with safety to the currency issues of national banks is emphasized by Senator John C. Spooner of Wisconsin, who declares that it is imperative that congress give immediate attention to this matter to insure against financial panics.

"It is necessary that something be done at the earliest possible day for the relief of the monetary system," said Senator Spooner, "if the banks are to be in position to give the country the relief that may at any time be required in order to avert what may be the most serious panic the country has ever experienced. It is well, of course, to keep in mind the necessary regulatory legislation, but a season of financial distress might wipe out more fortunes than the treatment of the last few years has accumulated."

Senator Spooner has no pride of opinion as to how the desired relief shall be secured, but he is inclined to favor emergency issues notes by the banks, subject to a graduated tax to prevent overissues, and the removal of the restriction upon the retirement of notes, such restrictions now forbidding the retirement of more than \$3,000,000 a month.

It is evident from his comments that the senator from Wisconsin regards legislation to avert possible financial distress as more important than revenue legislation or measures to increase taxation along various lines suggested.

Mentioned for Cabinet.

Senator Spooner came to Washington today on the invitation of the president to talk over important legal questions involved in the Cuban situation. His presence at the White House again started the story that he was to enter the cabinet early in the year when Secretary Shaw and Attorney General Moody retire. Another report credited the Wisconsin senator with having been given a tentative offer of the vacancy on the supreme bench. If the president is trying to draft the badger statesman into his cabinet it will not be the first time this has been tried unsuccessfully. Senator Spooner would not discuss either report, except to deny that he was ready to leave the congenial environment of the upper house of congress, where he has taken the lead in many a hard fought debate on the constitutionality of pending legislation. He has been a close adviser of the president in times past and the differences he had with the White House over the matter of his resignation have not changed his relations with Mr. Roosevelt.

### REVISION IS DEMANDED

Better Reciprocity Sought by National Implement Dealers.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—A revision of the general tariff laws of the United States and better reciprocity with foreign countries, especially England and Canada, was demanded in a resolution adopted by the National Association of Agricultural Implement and Vehiclemen at the closing session today of its thirteenth annual convention. The final session was devoted to a general discussion of the timber industry of the United States, in which it was pointed out that Canada had about the only product available for much of the business of the association members. The matter was finally disposed of by adopting a resolution calling on congress to revise the entire tariff laws bearing on lumber and its products, and calling for general reciprocity regarding all timber products. Jamestown, Va., was selected as the meeting place of the 1907 convention, and the following officers were elected: President, E. E. Miles, Racine, Wis.; secretary, J. A. Sanford, Chicago; treasurer, J. B. Bartholomew, Peoria, Ill.; chairman of the board of directors, Powell Sanders, Chattanooga, Tenn.
