

NEW YORK PARTY LEADERS GUESSING

Wise Ones on Both Sides Are Uneasy Over the Coming Election.

HEARST HAS TORN DOWN PARTY LINES

Empire State Results Sure to Have Strong Effect on the Presidential Race.

By W. W. Jermans. Washington, Oct. 20.—About two weeks remain of the campaign, and there isn't a man alive who can tell what is to happen in New York state, where Hearst and Hughes are contending for the governorship, and in all probability for the presidency also.

Cleavage in Both Parties.

Both parties in New York state are torn to pieces over the Hearst candidacy and the issues it has made. Hearst has lost democratic support in numerous places and he has gained republican support in other places. Similarly, Hughes is strong in his own party in certain quarters, and weaker in certain other quarters.

Effect on the Presidency.

The impression gains ground in this city that New York is to furnish one of the presidential nominees in 1908 in the person of the elected governor next month. Someone has recently recalled the fact that if "Old Bill" Allen had been elected governor of Ohio in 1875, in all probability he would have been elected president in 1876.

Bar to Hearst's Progress.

The thing which stands most prominently in the way of Hearst's presidential ambition, assuming for the moment that he is to be elected governor, is the attitude of the old southern states. Hearst has no following in that section of the country, and it is said that he cannot develop any following there. Should this remain the situation, Hearst could not hope to get a two-thirds majority in the democratic national convention.

OCEAN LINERS COLLIDE

Etruria Clashes with Minnehaha—The Former Injured.

New York, Oct. 20.—The steamer Etruria while bound out of New York harbor collided with the Minnehaha, also outward bound. The Minnehaha evidently suffered no injury as she continued on her way, but the Etruria, after over Sandy Hook bar, the Etruria was now anchored off Tompkinsville, Staten island.

YELLOW FEVER IN CUBA

Governor Magoon Has Outlined Infected Zone.

Havana, Oct. 20.—Yellow fever has become so threatening in the neighborhood of Cienfuegos and in this city that Governor Magoon has declared the municipal districts of Cureces, Ramcaño, Palmira and La Jai, to be an infected zone. A detention camp has been established near Cruces. Three more cases were reported yesterday and three more at Cruces.

EARTHQUAKE IN MAINE

Pictures Are Shaken from Walls at York.

York, Me., Oct. 20.—The earth shocks experienced last night in several York county towns along the coast were renewed today. Between 9 and 9:30 a. m. slight vibrations were noticeable. At 10:58 a. m. four or five quakes, much more perceptible than any previous ones, followed each other inside of a minute. Pictures fell from mantels and walls in some instances, doors were jarred and buildings shaken.

WOULD BE PRESIDENT



JOHN B. MORAN, Boston District Attorney Who Looks Forward to Entering Presidential Race.

MORAN IS OUT FOR PRESIDENCY

If He Carries Massachusetts He Will Rank with Bryan.

Moran, candidate for governor on three nominations, is announcing that under certain conditions he will be a candidate for the presidency of the United States. Hoffman, fainted and trampled on; Mrs. Lena Forman, portion of hair torn from head; Miss Maggie Finn, fainted and bruised.

CRUELTY CHARGED TO PHILANTHROPIST

Wealthy Man of Chicago Arrested for Alleged Beating of Servant.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—Thomas H. Gault was arrested today on the charge of beating an aged maidservant, Anna Cunningham. She has been confined to bed under the care of a physician for a week. Mr. Gault is a leader in the prohibition party. He is commonly reputed to be a millionaire. He is known as a philanthropist. His residence, 1680 West Congress street, is one of the most pretentious homes on the West Side. He is a trustee in the exclusive First United Presbyterian church. He teaches a Sabbath school class. His money made possible the erection of the new big church edifice on Central Park avenue.

CREW IS DROWNED IN SUBMARINE

Conning Tower of the Lost French Diving Vessel Found Open.

Journal Special Service. Paris, Oct. 20.—Divers have discovered that the French submarine boat Lutin, which sank off Bizerte, is full of water. The hood of the conning tower was found open, obstructed by two bodies, proving that all within must have been drowned. The submarine Korrigane, which plunged alongside the wreck yesterday, reports, however, having seen High burning within the lost vessel. During the night tugs succeeded in chaining two buoys over the bow of the Lutin and two over the stern by means of large chains passed around the keel.

DOES DEATH MEAN BANDITS' REVENGE?

Unknown Dead Man Resembles Sekuloff, Prominent in Macedonian Murder Inquiry.

Should Corpse Be His Murderous Plot Is Still Working.

Was the man whose dead body was taken from the river yesterday Jan Sekuloff, leader of the mysterious gang of Macedonians, six of whom were murdered last spring in a shack at 243 Tenth avenue S?

The resemblance between the man who was drowned and the Macedonian is so strong that those who have viewed the dead body think they are the same. No one has appeared at the morgue to claim the body. It was found near the power dam yesterday, and there was not an article that would lead to identification. This fact has caused the police to become suspicious. Another peculiar fact is that all the toes are missing from the right foot and two from the left. As the wounds are not completely healed, it is thought that they were cut off within the last few months. They may have been injured during some struggle and where later amputated.

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LAWYER MURDERED

Chicago Attorney's Body Found at Bottom of Elevator Shaft.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—The body of Charles H. Stevenson, an attorney, was found early today at the bottom of a freight elevator shaft in the rear of a building at 96 Washington street. It was at first supposed that Mr. Stevenson had fallen down the shaft, but later developments led to the opinion that the attorney had been robbed and murdered. Mr. Stevenson is said to have been a distant relative of former Vice President Adlai Stevenson.

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STORM DEATH TOLL IS HEAVY

Hundreds Perish by the Foundering of Workmen's Barges Near Key West.

SEMI-PANICKY DAY ON STOCK 'CHANGE

London Turns a Heavy Seller and All Prices Seek a Lower Level.

New York, Oct. 20.—There was a renewal of urgent liquidation in the stock market today which carried early prices 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 below last night for the active speculative favorites.

The change in the money situation, resulting from yesterday's advance in the Bank of England's discount rate from 5 to 6 per cent was the motive force for the unloading of speculative accounts. Evidence of the heavy movement of currency to the interior for crop moving purposes and the Canadian requirements to fortify the Toronto banks complicated the money situation.

The liquidation was pursued on a large scale, but large buying orders for supporting purposes restrained the decline after the opening drop, but did not entirely stop it.

London was again a heavy seller in this market, next week's settlements there doubtless accounting in part for the liquidation from that center. Much of yesterday's and today's selling represented the closing of traders' accounts.

The force of the liquidation broke through the support from time to time, making a lower level of prices. Some of the extreme declines: Great Northern preferred, 7; Reading, 6 1/4; Canadian Pacific, 4 1/4; Smelting, 4; St. Paul, 3 1/2; Union Pacific, 3 1/4; Baltimore & Ohio, 2 1/2, and the active list generally up to 3 1/2 points.

The market closed in a semi-panicky condition at severe declines from last night's prices through the list.

Gold Withdrawn.

It became definitely known today that about \$10,000,000 in gold would be shipped from England within the week, of which amount \$4,950,000 went today to Egypt, according to announcements, but its exact destination continues to be more or less of a mystery, also Egypt appears to be getting the bulk of the gold, with Argentina and Canada taking less amounts.

PURE FOOD RULES ARE PUBLISHED

Regulations Regarding Labeling of Packages Issued by Secretary Wilson.

Washington, Oct. 20.—Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture today promulgated the regulations which will govern the labeling of pure food and drug act will be enforced.

The section of the regulations respecting the labeling of products requires that the ingredients of the package shall be stated so that the purchaser may know precisely what he is buying.

In the matter of coloring, the requirements are made that no ingredient known to be injurious to health shall be used by manufacturers. This applies with particular force to the manufacture of candy.

Advertisement, particularly of drugs, is prohibited, but standard drugs will not be considered adulterated, provided they are branded so as to show their actual strength or purity.

Poisonous or deleterious preservatives shall only be applied externally and shall be of a kind that will not permeate to the interior of the product and the preservative must be of such character that any removed, the food products will be inedible.

Misbranding of food or drug products is guarded against particularly. The label on every product must bear the name of the product, the place of manufacture and must show whether the article is a compound, mixture or blend, and must designate the ingredients and proportions in the case of drugs and foods. The use of any false or misleading statement, design or device on the label is specifically prohibited.

STEAMER RESCUES 49 FROM ONE BARGE ON WHICH WERE 150 MEN.

Twenty Lives Are Lost in Havana—\$2,000,000 Damage to Property.

Key West, Fla., Oct. 20.—The Austrian steamer Jennie, Captain Duding, bound from Gulfport for Genoa, has called at this port to land forty-nine workmen picked up at sea near the Havana coast, 100 miles from Key West. The men were part of a force of 150 workmen on east coast extension work.

Most of the others were either killed or drowned in the storm early Tuesday. Nine other barges crowded with workmen engaged in extension work were at sea with barge No. 4. There is no news of them and it is feared all were lost.

W. P. Dusenbury, one of the engineers saved by the steamer Jennie, says the storm struck barge No. 4 at 5 o'clock Thursday morning. One hour later the houseboat went to pieces in the raging sea and thirty to forty men were killed in the crash. Dusenbury says nine other barges working on the extension at Long Key went to sea with barge No. 4. He has no intelligence of their fate and fears for their safety.

Officers of the rescuing steamer Jennie say that they heard cries for help Thursday night, and following the direction of the sounds came upon a lot of men floating in the sea clinging to logs, lumber and small rafts. Boats were lowered and the forty-nine men brought in were rescued. Three other steamers using lights came on the scene and assisted in saving lives.

How many were rescued was not ascertained by those on board the steamer Jennie.

THIRTY-FIVE LOST ON STEAMER

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 20.—A special to the Metropolitan from Miami, Fla., says: The Miami steamer St. Lucia was crushed by the big waves in Thursday's hurricane and out of 100 persons on board 35 were lost. The steamer Peerless also lost about the same number, they being blown off the vessel.

TWENTY DEATHS IN HAVANA

\$2,000,000 Damage to Property Is Also Sustained.

Havana, Oct. 20.—A cyclone of unprecedented severity, accompanied by a terrific downpour of rain, swept over the provinces of Havana and Pinar del Rio Wednesday night and resulted in twenty deaths in this city and the serious injury of many thousands of persons. The damage is estimated at fully \$2,000,000. The dead are all Cubans of the poorer class.

The United States cruiser Brooklyn dragged her anchor until her stern grounded in the mud off La Regla. She got off this morning without injury.

The storm caused great havoc and confusion in the shipping in the harbor. Many buildings were badly damaged and nearly all the trees in the city and suburbs were uprooted.

SOLDIERS LOSE TENTS

The 2,000 American soldiers and marines at Camp Columbia were put to great inconvenience by the storm. Nearly all the tents in camp were blown down, but there was little actual damage done. Harry Fosdick, an army teamster with the Twenty-eighth Infantry from Sioux City, Iowa, sustained probably fatal injury when he was crushed by a tree which fell thru the barracks in which he was sleeping. Fred Sutcliffe of Fort Snelling and Thomas Shornum of Reading, Pa., sustained injuries.

TOBACCO DESTROYED

One hundred and fifty tobacco bars in the Alquizar district have been destroyed. The recently-planted tobacco crop also has been seriously damaged. Enormous damage is reported from La Guira, the center of the banana-growing industry. These crops are said to have been practically destroyed. Many small farmers have lost their all and are in great distress.

STREETCARS TIED UP

All streetcar service in Havana was paralyzed and communication with outside points was impossible. The telegraphic service was annihilated. The first train to come into the city since the storm was the Santiago express, which arrived yesterday afternoon. Passengers report that the devastation does not reach far to the eastward.

CRUISERS ADRIFF

The storm caused the greatest damage and confusion in the harbor. The Brooklyn drifted further than any other warship and finally brought up off La Regla with her stern in the mud. She got off this morning under her own steam, and has sustained no injury. The cruiser Denver, the cruiser Minneapolis, the battleship Texas and the auxiliary cruiser Prairie and the supply ship Celtic all dragged their anchors more or less, but prompt seamanship averted collisions. These ships were all made fast to permanently anchored buoys which never before were known to drag. The damage sustained by the squadron amounts to little.

AMERICAN LEGATION LOST
