CARE OF THE EYES, BROWS AND LASHES

By Eleanor Morris. The brightness of the eyes and their strength depend upon the condition of the body. If the body is weakened by disease, or exhausted by overwork, the eyes will be dull and heavy. Never, in any of the above cases, should drugs be used to brighten the eyes, as the use of such will certainly bring ruin and destroy one of God's greatest gifts. The eye is subject to many ills which should only be prescribed for by a physician, and never by the laity. When the eyes are tired or a little inflamed from cold, bathing in warm water, into which a little borax is put, is perfectly safe to use as a home remedy. Other than this, nothing but what a physician would advise.

Nothing connected with the face is so susceptible of improvement as the brows and lashes, and it is surprising to me that, in place of penciling and dyeing these, women do not cultivate legitimate beauty in them. There are eyebrow brushes which can be purchased in any of the shops, and a small, fine toothbrush answers the purpose as well. With this the brows should be brushed night and morning to promote their growth and train them into shape. Starting, the brows should be made into the most beautiful arches by the electric needle, and should this be beyond your means, each night put on some muckilage made from quince seeds dissolved in rosemary or rosewater. Let the gum dry on and in the morning bathe in warm water. A couple of months of such treatment will bring the most unruly brows to subjection, and coarse hairs will drop out.

To increase the growth of the lashes is a very difficult thing to do and requires deftness to apply the lotions to prevent any from getting into the eye, as it would be irritated by the slightest particle. A simple remedy, and one which, if any at all, will coax the lashes to grow, is made from sulphate of quinine, 5 grains; sweet almond oil, 1 ounce. Apply with a fine sable brush.

What the Market Affords

Sliced ham, 15 and 18 cents a pound. Creamery butter, brick, 30 cents a pound. Butter, 28 cents. Corn, 10 cents. Hubbard squash, 4 cents each. Cornmeal, ten-pound sack; white, 20 cents; yellow, 18 cents. Orange marmalade, 25 cents a jar.

Steamed cornbread is a much liked dish in some families. To make it sift into a large bowl two cups of corn-meal and one of flour, with two spoons of white sugar, salt, and a teaspoon of baking soda, also a teaspoon of salt. Mix all together with the hand, and hollow the heap in the middle. Melt a tablespoonful of butter and stir it into the mixture. Add a little milk, or of lopped milk. Beat this into the flour and meal slowly, at first, then hard for three minutes, to insure thorough mixing. Pour into a greased mold with a close-fitting top, set in a pot of boiling water and keep in at a steady boil for two hours. Turn out on a plate and set in the oven for five minutes to dry off. A soft crust will form upon it, rendering cutting easier than if it had been sent directly to the table. In cutting cornbread hold the knife perpendicularly and cut toward you, slowly and carefully, not to crush the tender loaf.
