What Other People Think

The Monday Night Non-Partizan Meeting.

To the Editor of The Journal.
The conditions surrounding the advertised non-partizan citizens' meeting at the Auditorium next Monday evening are simply these:

The committee of business men interested in Mayor Jones' election decided, before the primary election occurred, that, in case Mayor Jones were nominated, there should be held on some evening prior to the general election, a citizens' non-partizan meeting, to which should be invited all those, irrespective of party affiliations, who favored his re-election; and, immediately after his nomination, the Auditorium was secured for the Monday evening immediately preceding election day. The business men's committee takes full responsibility for the plan adopted.

It may not be generally known, but it is nevertheless a fact, that generous contributions of time, service and money in the interest of Mayor Jones' re-election have been made by leading democrats of the city. As a representative business men's committee we have no apologies to make for advertising a straight out-and-out citizens' meeting—and, by the way, it is going to be a hummer.

There is not the slightest disposition on the part of the committee to ignore any one—least of all Senator Nelson. It must be evident that a so-called citizens' meeting would be a farce unless political lines were entirely obliterated and the speakers were thoroughly representative of the citizenship at large, irrespective of party.

This is to be a home meeting, a meeting of our own citizens, addressed by our own citizens, on matters connected with our own civic affairs; national and state politics are not to be discussed or referred to. We are simply carrying out the original plan of holding a citizens' meeting and we have found it impossible to arrange such a meeting unless we eliminated all political coloring. In fact, we have found it absolutely impossible to arrange a program on any other basis—a program which would provide a list of speakers

who will confine themselves entirely to local issues.

There is nothing but good will felt by the business men's committee to other workers, but we had planned for a citizens' meeting—it could not be arranged on any other basis than we have arranged it, and every republican, every democrat, every prohibitionist, every laboring man, every municipal ownership advocate, and every one who has his heart set on Mayor Jones' re-election, or who desires to be informed at first hand by men who know the conditions as they exist, is cordially invited to attend.

Charivari Party Near Stoughton, Wis., Use Dynamite.

FARMERS WIN IN COURT

Opponents of Railroad Get Injunction Against New Line.

Lodi, Ohio, Nov. 1.—The courts have intervened to prevent the fight between the farmers and the Baltimore & Ohio, which threatened to cause bloodshed. Attorneys have secured an injunction restraining the company from relaying its tracks and rebuilding the embankment across the country where they had been torn out on Tuesday.

LEAVES \$76,500 FOR MISSIONS.

Cincinnati, Nov. 1.—Stocks worth \$76,500 were left to the Rev. Frank H. Nelson, rector of Christ Episcopal church as trustee, by the will of Mrs. Charles Cassidy, prominent as a philanthropist in Cincinnati and New York. The will has not yet been probated, but the fact of this bequest, which is for home and foreign missions, became known yesterday.

HELD IN MARIU TOBA

N. D. WITNESSES NERVOUSLY TWIDDLE THEIR FINGERS.

The Trial of Martin Doyle at Morden for the Murder of Vincent Weiler Has Some Sensational Features—Wealthy Man Accused.

Morden, Man., Nov. 1.—A sensational feature of the trial of Martin Doyle for the murder of Vincent Weiler at Snowflake, was the arrest of Christopher Foley on charge of attempting to intimidate witnesses from North Dakota. Foley is a former chum of Martin Doyle. He was locked up in Morden jail. Doyle is accused of shooting Weiler to secure possession of a farm which he owned at Mount Carmel, N. D., where both lived. Weiler's body was found last spring in the woods near Snowflake. It is said that the defense will endeavor to show that the body found some time subsequent on the prairie near Morris, Man., but which afterwards disappeared was that of Weiler, and that he was seen in some part of Canadian west, subsequent to date on which body was found at Snowflake.

When arraigned Doyle pleaded not guilty. He is wealthy and intends to put up a stiff fight.

Dr. Speechly of Pilot Mound stated that the bullet wound thru the back of the head, passing upwards towards the front of the brain had been the cause of death. The wound could not have been self-inflicted.

A large number of witnesses are Americans who are anxious to get back for elections next Tuesday, as three of them are running for state office.

FOREIGNERS GIVE TROUBLE

Courts at Winnipeg Have to Use Interpreters.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 1.—Michael Hyduk and Danelo Kamylo, charged with beating a man to death during the progress of a wedding celebration on the Russian Green Fest, June 4, on Magnus street, Winnipeg, were found guilty of manslaughter. Fred Posternuk was acquitted. The assizes of Winnipeg have now been sitting for eight days, and it is expected that a remarkable curious religious case of criminal libel against a Hungarian priest by a Polish newspaper.

MAN-OF-WAR'S SILVER

New York, Nov. 1.—Captain Colwell of the United States cruiser Denver, after the manner of all careful hosts, did not neglect to court his spoons and his plate when the ball which he and his officers tendered Havana society on Wednesday night, Oct. 24, was drawing to a brilliant close. The result of this more or less perfunctory attention to a mere housekeeping detail was, to say the least, extraordinary.

Captain Colwell was presented with a handsome gold watch in the name of the Cubans. He expressed his deep gratitude and then spoke as follows:

"Some of the cups of the rich and artistic service given this evening on the day of its baptism by the citizens of Denver have disappeared. Of course, I know perfectly well that there has been no robbery in Manhattan and that none of you are going to carry away in the tail pockets of your dress suits a cup smelling of champagne punch merely for the sake of the same. I thoroughly appreciate that it has been merely the prompting of an artistic impulse and a desire to retain a souvenir of the Denver but I would be very much obliged if the cups were returned." Captain Colwell's plea was rewarded by the return of numerous pieces of valuable plate.

PAWNED BABE'S CLOTHES TO PURCHASE CIGARETS

New York, Nov. 1.—Robert Stokes, a truck driver of Williamsburg, was arraigned yesterday in Manhattan avenue police court on complaint of his wife, who declared that Stokes, in order to obtain cigars, to the use of which he was addicted, took the clothes off his infant child and sold them.

Stokes' wife appeared in court with the child in her arms. She showed a handful of pawn tickets representing clothing and bedding, which Stokes had pawned to get money for cigars. "He has made us poor," said Mrs. Stokes, "by his excessive use of cigars." Stokes was held in \$300 bail.

LAURIER'S MAN WINS

Deposed Minister of Finance Victor Over Conservative.

Liverpool, N. S., Nov. 1.—The administration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier won a pronounced victory in a by-election held in the Queens-Shelburne district yesterday to fill the vacancy in the federal parliament caused by the unseating of W. S. Fielding, finance minister and liberal leader in Nova Scotia, for irregularities committed by agents in the general election. Mr. Fielding was re-elected by more than 1,000 majority over Dr. W. C. Weldon, the conservative candidate.

The defeat of Weldon by so decisive a vote is attributed to the defection of hundreds of conservatives who were not in favor of any opposition to the return of the finance minister. The defeated candidate is dean of the law school of Dalhousie university.

HARJE'S CASE COMES NEXT

Millionaire Will Be Tried with Negro on Conspiracy Charge.

Pittsburg, Nov. 1.—Augustus Hartje, the millionaire paper manufacturer, his brother-in-law, John L. Welshons and Clifford Hoee, the negro, formerly employed as coachman by Hartje, will be arraigned tomorrow on charges of conspiracy provided the present plans of counsel are carried out.

Hoee, the negro, was convicted Tuesday of perjury in connection with an affidavit he made that he had been intimate with Mrs. Hartje. It is in connection with this affidavit of Hoee's that the conspiracy charges arise. It is alleged that Hartje and Welshons persuaded Hoee to make the affidavit that he had been intimate with Mrs. Hartje.
