

FIRST FIGURES ARE TOO CONSERVATIVE

Johnson Running Away with Minnesota to the Tune of 65,000 or More.

Somebody stop John A. Johnson. Minnesota's chain lightning governor got such a start that he seems to be running yet. His own committee admits that it did not appreciate the strength of the governor's popularity. The more complete the returns are, the higher his majority mounts. The Journal's figures of 60,000 yesterday, which were much the highest of any put out in the first twenty-four hours, now seem conservative.

Hennepin with twenty-six precincts to hear from gives Cole 11,649; Johnson 23,023. It is practically two to one, and the remaining precincts will probably run the plurality in this county up to 13,000. It makes those democrats who were claiming 900 in Hennepin wonder if they really know anything about politics, while the republicans who claimed the county for Hennepin isn't the only Johnson county in the state, however. Old Goodhue pulls in with 359 for Johnson. St. Louis county, proud stronghold of the party, reports 1,484 for Johnson in 109 precincts. There are eighteen missing, which will probably raise the figure. The ninth district is all one-sided, with close to 2,000 for Eberhart, and every other county in the district lining up strong. The third district counties are all Johnson, and seven democratic senators are elected on the Johnson wave in that district.

There is no danger of the republicans losing anything else on the state ticket. Eberhart, for lieutenant governor, suffered most by coming so near the governor, and will go thru by a much lower plurality than expected. He seems to have carried the normal republican counties right along, however. Only a few counties have canvassed the vote on minor offices, but the following samples show how the vote is lining up on second place:

This would indicate that Mr. Eberhart will be elected by 20,000 plurality or more. The democratic candidates for clerk of the supreme court and railroad commissioner received a good many republican votes, and will make a good showing. Julius Schmalz for secretary of state also cut considerably, but is probably elected by 50,000.

SAD MIX-UP ON THE AMENDMENTS

Tally Sheets Gave Them in Different Order from Ballot—They May Carry.

Four counties have reported their vote on the wide-open tax amendment, and it has received a majority in each one. If the rest of the state holds up to this ratio the amendment will have a comfortable margin. The good roads and peddling amendments run higher in some places and lower in others, so their outcome is doubtful. The amendment must have a majority of all the votes cast at the election. The four counties reporting give the following as their total vote, and as the vote for the tax amendment:

Great confusion has probably resulted from an error in the tally sheets sent out from the secretary of state's office. On the ballot the good roads amendment to Article 16 of the constitution came first, and the tax amendment to Article 9, was second. The tally sheets on which judges and clerks of election made the returns have reversed this order, and call first for a return on the amendment to Article 9, and second for the vote on the amendment to Article 16.

Unless both amendments are found to have a majority on the returns, it may be necessary to provide for the expense of a recount of the whole state.

HAMMOND BY 1,000

Second District Result Not as Close as Supposed.

Winfield S. Hammond is elected to congress from the second district by very close to 1,000 plurality. The more complete returns have increased his margin instead of reducing it, indicating that Hammond ran strong in the back precincts which are late in reporting. The figures by counties are as follows, a plurality being indicated where only one column is filled:

Committee Probabilities. The positions of the other members of the Minnesota delegation on committees in the sixtieth congress will be as follows: The committee on Indian affairs appropriations; Davis goes up to sixth place on agriculture, because of the retirement of Wadsworth, Croner and Brooks and the death of Adams of Wisconsin; Stevens retains his position on interstate and foreign commerce and will be fourth man on immigration and naturalization; Volstead becomes third man on public lands by the retirement of Chairman Lacey and others, and will be a member of the most important sub-committees, dealing with public land legislation.

Advances for North Dakotans. North Dakota members will go up a few pegs on their committees. Marshall will be third on the Indian affairs and consequently one of the leading members of the committee and Gronna will have eighth place on public lands. South Dakota will be without representation on the Indian affairs and public lands, but the successors of Messrs.
