GETTING ELECTION NEWS BY PHONE



Thoro preparation and the marshaling of a great force of men and women—these were the factors which enabled the Northwestern Telephone company to give its rapid and accurate bulletin service on the night following the late election.

Two direct wires, one for receiving and one for transmitting, connected the Minneapolis exchange with Chicago and over these two wires all the eastern reports were received in bulletins which came continuously for five hours.

The work at the central office in Minneapolis was divided into three departments—receiving, compiling and transmitting. To handle these three phases of the work 120 clerks and stenographers were employed.

Music for the meeting of the American Federation of Labor which begins its sittings tomorrow morning, will be furnished by a band of 100 pieces picked from the 300 members of the Minneapolis Musicians' association.

Following the opening of the convention the band will return to Alexander hall, where the Musicians' association will tender a reception to its representatives in the national body.

Among the pieces especially rearranged for the association's mammoth parade are Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever," Wagner's "Ring of the Nibelungen" and "America's Republic March."

CHILD SAYS BABY BURIED IN GROVE

RESIDENTS IN NORTH MINNEAPOLIS PURSUE FRUITLESS QUEST.

Boy Declares He Saw a Big Boy Enter the Body of an Infant, and the Women of the Neighborhood Have Been Seeking the Grave.

Digging for a buried baby is a quest which is becoming of absorbing interest among the residents, particularly the women residents, in the vicinity of Thomas avenue N and the Robbinsdale carline.

Lester Revoier, the 5-year-old son of C. J. Revoier, 3306 Thomas avenue N, is responsible for the quest. Monday afternoon he came home at 4 o'clock with tear-stained cheeks and told of seeing a big boy bury a baby with bloodstained face and head in the woods near his "playhouse."

The persistence with which the little lad has stuck to his statement that a baby was buried, despite all suggestions to have been made, has been a dog or a cat or some other object, have convinced his mother and some other women that he is right and they are actively engaged in searching the woods. The boy had never seen a burial, so there seems no reason for his imagining anything of the sort.

Since Monday, when the burial is supposed to have been made, many lives have fallen and there have been several showers. In consequence it is doubtful if the grave, if grave there is, will be discovered, save by accident.

GUESSERS PICKING HEADQUARTERS STAFF

THAT'S WHERE MR. HAYNES IS LIKELY TO MAKE CHANGES.

Leaving Politics Out of Account Captain Henry Getchell's Name Is Most Mentioned for Police Superintendent—Then the Detective Force Is Likely to See Shifts.

What will be the personnel of the police headquarters staff after Jan. 1, 1907?

Mayor-elect James C. Haynes has announced that he will make as few changes in the police department as possible, but these changes will be made where the best effect can be obtained.

Following the appointment of the superintendent the detective force will undoubtedly be the next consideration of the precinct captains and is not likely to be changed.

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Those who claim to be close to the mayor-elect say he will have a captain of detectives, who will direct the criminal investigations, subject to the approval of the superintendent.

There are already two candidates for this office if it is created. They are Charles Brown and Detective Joseph Lawrence. Both men are experienced policemen and will have plenty of backing.

Lawrence was in business in Seattle, Wash., for several years and was not in the city during the former Haynes administration, but is a veteran in point of service, having been a detective for more than fifteen years.

Charles Brown was on the force under Haynes, but was let out early soon after Mayor Jones took the chair.

Joseph Scallen, pawnbroker inspector, will hardly be removed, as he was appointed by Haynes.

Two of the desk sergeants, Joseph Shultz and John Galen, stand in about the same light, as they served in that place under Haynes. The other desk sergeant is Myron Johnson, who was promoted from patrolman to sergeant in 1905, and that puts him in the same list.

There are two positions now vacant at headquarters which Mr. Haynes can fill if he sees fit. At present there is no captain for the Central precinct.
