PULLMAN PASSES WEAPONS OF LEWIS

List of 1,000 Judges and State Officers as Evidence in Tax Suit.

Chicago, Nov. 14.—One of the weapons that will be used by Corporation Counsel J. Hamilton Lewis in his fight with the Pullman company to secure unpaid taxes for Chicago is a list of nearly one thousand names of circuit and district federal judges, governors and state officers in various states who hold Pullman passes. The list is said to contain the names of members of the Illinois state board of equalization and other prominent officials of Illinois. The list was secured by Maxwell Edgar, special attorney for the city in tax matters. The Pullman company admits its existence and asserts that it was stolen by a former employee who was discharged for dishonorable practices. Before he became an attorney Mr. Edgar was a railroad employer. Aside from the assertion that the members of the board of equalization soon to pass on taxation of additional taxes for the Pullman company—hold annual passes, the only names of passholders made public yesterday by Edgar were those of Judge Peter S. Grosscup and Judge Christian C. Kohlsaat, both of the United States circuit court of the northern district of Illinois, and Fred W. Upham of the Cook county board of review, which several months ago returned to the \$28,000,000 surplus of the Pullman company. Judge Grosscup denies that he uses any passes now, altho in the old days he did.

GREAT FORESTS CLOSED; ROCKEFELLER VICTOR

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 14.—By a decision of the court of appeals yesterday the great forests of the Adirondacks are closed to the public and incidentally William Rockefeller is awarded 18 cents damages and \$700.21 costs against a trespasser after four years of litigation. The ruling of the lower courts against Oliver Lamora of Franklin county was affirmed in part of the St. Regis river flowing thru the great preserve of Mr. Rockefeller in the Adirondacks is affirmed. The settlement of the suit, which has been bitterly contested in the courts, has an important bearing on the privacy of the Adirondack estates of many of America's wealthiest citizens. The decision means that henceforth thousands of acres of forests are the exclusive domain of their millionaire owners and will affect the fortunes of thousands of residents to whom heretofore the great woods have been free.

LOCKING SIX IN VAULT, LONE HOLDUP ROBS BANK

Newton, Kan., Nov. 14.—The Midland bank of Newton was held up late yesterday by one man and robbed of \$1,000 in currency. The robber presented a letter to Herman Suderman, the cashier, stating who he was and what he wanted, also advising the clerks and bystanders that they would die together should any effort be made to detain him. Six or seven persons were in the bank and all were ordered into the vault and locked in. The robber then secured what currency was in sight and escaped.

CAUGHT IN ROCK SHOWER, HE SLAYS BLAST FOREMAN

Huntington, W. Va., Nov. 14.—Wesley Hardway, a gang boss, was instantly killed and three negro workmen badly wounded by Fred Atkins, 19, on the Deep Water railroad, under construction in Wyoming county. Atkins was passing the spot where a blast was set off and the fragments of stone from the blast showered about him, enraging him so that he emptied his revolver at the workmen, killing one and injuring three. He fled to the hills and has not been captured.

READY FOR OIL TRUST WAR

Washington, Nov. 14.—Formal action by the government against the Standard Oil company for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law is likely to be begun tomorrow in the United States circuit court at St. Louis. The action will be in the form of a bill of complaint and will ask the court to grant an order restraining the Standard Oil company from engaging in commerce in restraint of trade. For some time the attorney general, Assistant Attorney General Purdy, Commissioner of Corporations Garfield and Special Attorneys Morrison and Kellogg have been engaged in going over the case of this great monopoly. The bill of complaint of the department of justice was drawn some time ago, and it has now been perfected. The bill of complaint has been revised and is now in type, ready to be presented to the court. While the attorney general will not state when it will be filed, he did say it would not be done today.

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New York, Nov. 14.—Richard Croker is coming back to Tammany Hall with the purpose of deposing Charles F. Murphy and, it is said, placing Maurice Featherston, former dock commissioner, on the Tammany throne. This statement is made by several Tammany politicians in a position to know from the "inside" the plans of the anti-Murphy faction in Tammany. Richard Croker, Jr., will sail next Saturday for Ireland and will meet his father, and will accompany him back to New York in the first week of December. Soon after his arrival here it is expected the fight on Murphy will begin.
