

NOTED MENT TO SPEAK IN CITY ON THE KAW

Secretaries Root and Shaw, Bryan
and Harriman on the
Program.

Kansas City, Nov. 19.—Guests to the Commercial club banquet tonight and guests and delegates to the trans-Mississippi commercial congress, which will meet here on Tuesday in annual convention, poured into Kansas City today from all directions. They included a cabinet officer, several foreign diplomats, United States senators and congressmen, governors and mayors, governmental department experts from Washington, together with representatives of numerous commercial organizations, lawyers and railway officials.

Elihu Root, secretary of state, who is expected to define the government's stand on the Monroe doctrine and South American relations, arrived on an early train from Chicago, while David R. Francis, heading a delegation of Missourians and escorting Minister Calderon of Bolivia, Minister Pardo of Peru and Minister Cortes of Colombia with Minister to Colombia John Barrett, with whom the foreigner left Washington, arrived from St. Louis. Representatives of Brazil and Chile had come in yesterday, about the same time that E. H. Harriman, with a party of railway officials arrived on a special train from Chicago. Brazil and Chile will make short talks.

Shaw and Bryan, too.

Among others who have accepted invitations to deliver addresses during the week are Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, E. H. Harriman, W. J. Bryan, twelve United States senators, fifteen representatives, governors of twenty states, mayors of thirty or more cities and representatives of various commercial bodies from all parts of the country. Fifteen hundred accredited delegates are expected to be present.

Among the topics to be discussed are food control, harbor improvements, merchant marine, oriental trade, Alaska, the Columbia river, irrigation, forestry, San Francisco naval business, government ownership of railroads, telegraph lines and public utilities, levee systems in Texas and Louisiana, the anti-American, the drainage of public lands, stockhold, and deep water from the lake to the gulf.

COP SHOT BY STUDENTS

Policeman Injured in Riot of Arkansas University Men.

Fayetteville, Ark., Nov. 19.—Henry Rouse, a policeman, was shot and seriously injured here in a riot with students of the University of Arkansas. Three hundred college boys were parading the streets and giving their college yell because of an athletic victory over a rival college. When the officer asked the students to be less riotous they defied him and he arrested one of them. The students then surrounded the officer and in the melee which followed, he was shot in the back.
