COMMISSION GETS FULL INFORMATION

INTERSTATE COMMERCE MEMBERS ADJOURN TO DULUTH.
Details of Grain Business as It Is Conducted in Northwest Are Told by Elevator Men and Dealers—Report of Investigation Will Be Made To Senate.

The Minneapolis hearings conducted by the interstate commerce commission for the purpose of investigating methods used in the grain business of the northwest, came to an abrupt end yesterday, the attorney for the commission stating that he had examined all the witnesses and that because of an investigation being made along the same line by the federal grand jury, he did not desire to summon certain parties who might give further light on the subject; but who were to give consideration by that body. Commissioner C. A. Prouty thereupon announced that the commission would consider itself adjourned till 10 a. m. today in Duluth.

According to Commissioner F. K. Lane, it will be at least a month before the result of the investigation here will be made public. "We shall make our report to the United States senate about the middle of December," said Commissioner Lane to The Journal. "Nothing is to be given out until that time. The senate will be the first to receive the result of the research we have conducted."

Merely an Investigation.
"It should be borne in mind that our hearings have not been the result of any complaint; that we have not been sitting in this matter as a court to hear charges and make rulings in accordance with allegations made. This is simply an investigation, and our report will simply be a statement of conditions which we have observed and shall follow in its lines the subject matter of the resolution of Senator La Follette which brought these hearings in the matter of grain operations, into life."

The first witness yesterday devoted most of their time to the subject of farmers' representation on the Chamber of Commerce floor.

F. C. Van Dusen was the first witness. He testified that he is the lack of railroad facilities that is retarding the movement of the crop, and not limited accommodation for terminal storage. He said that the total capacity is 34,550,000 bushels. These elevators now have on hand 9,878,000 bushels. At Minneapolis the terminal capacity is 38,000,000 bushels. There is on hand 5,657,000 bushels.

Membership Is Denied.
George Case, resident manager of the Farmers' Exchange of Minnesota, was called and testified that the organization of farmers which he tried to get a seat in the Chamber of Commerce, but had been turned down; that such seat was wanted to save commissions which the farmers otherwise have to pay thru the Chamber for disposition of their grain. The Farmers' Elevator committee made application for a seat in the Chamber of Commerce in a letter, July, 1905. He introduced in evidence a letter from the secretary of the Chamber stating briefly that the application had been considered by the board of directors, but not granted.

L. T. Jamme, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was called and gave an explanation which was given as a ground for complaint on the part of the farmers.

"In June, 1905," he said, "the Minnesota Farmers' exchange, thru the membership of E. H. Mendenhall, a member of the farmers' organization, asked for a corporate membership in the Chamber. According to the rules of the Chamber, we asked for a financial statement. This statement was given and duly considered. It was found that, as a matter of fact, the organization at that time was in an insolvent condition. In view of the fact that applicants will not be admitted who are not financially responsible, a regulation established as a matter of sound business principles, the application was declined with a statement that if the farmers' organization desired to be admitted on a financial basis to comply with our rules, we would be happy again to consider their application. I understand that some time later there was a meeting of the Farmers' exchange and considerable indignation was aroused by a statement that we would not accept in membership their organization. The exchange appointed a committee further to confer with us as to the reasons."

Explanation Satisfactory.
Mr. Jamme then presented a stenographic report of what took place during a meeting of the Farmers' exchange and the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, in which the committee members stated they were thoroughly satisfied with the explanation and signed their intention of complying with the demands made as to a better financial showing being necessary. But, as yet, no further application for membership has been received from the Minnesota Farmers' exchange.

Mr. Jamme further explained that the exchange is glad to do what it can to aid the farmers; that it is not opposed to having farmers' organizations for members, and at the present time has one such membership, that of the Farmers' Grain company of North Dakota, which operates eleven elevators.


