LABORERS SPARED BY DARING BANDIT

Poor Men and Women Not Molested by Train Robber—Once in Army.

Marshall, Mo., Nov. 27.—The bandit who held up the Chicago & Alton train Monday morning between Glasgow and Slater, Mo., has offered to make a full confession of the charge against him is made burglary.

In Missouri the extreme penalty for train robbery is death, the minimum ten years in prison. The prosecutor refused any concession. The bandit then volunteered a statement as follows:

My name is Claude Randall; my age 29 years; my brother was the one who robbed the Golden State Limited, and he told me that the Golden State Limited did not stop between Slater and Mexico, and for that reason I came to Slater to get on the train. I got in the smoking car and went thru it and robbed two or three other cars. I did not take any money from workmen or ladies, as I only wanted to take money from those that had made it easy and could afford it.

Made One "Dig Up."

"One man, when he heard me tell another passenger that I did not want any of his money because he was a laborer, said he was a laborer also. I did not believe him, and asked him to show me his hands. Upon looking at them I found them as soft as a woman's. I then made him 'dig up,' taking from him his \$45 watch, which I told him I would send to his Louis R. public, where he could get it, as I only wanted it to keep time by until I got to my destination.

"I allowed the conductor to get too close to me and he grabbed my pistol and my throat. He then wrenched the pistol from me, and I broke and ran to the back of the train. Many of the passengers and all of the train crew rushed upon me while the train was in motion, struck me upon the head with the pistol and tried to throw me overboard while the train was running thirty miles an hour.

Got \$1,500 in Cash.

"I got about \$1,500 and about eight or ten watches from the passengers on the train. I did not want this jewelry, but they forced me to take it.

The prisoner is now awaiting a preliminary hearing. He shows evidence of his capture and he has a deep gash in his forehead, which he struck over the head with a pistol.

The officers are confident from the evidence they had that it was this man who robbed the Golden State limited, and not his "brother."

LID ISSUE UP IN CHICAGO

Mayor Dunne Faces Demand for Sunday Closing of Saloons.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Mayor Dunne must face the Sunday closing issue squarely, according to plans laid at a secret meeting of the members of the executive committee of the Sunday Closing league. Mandamus proceedings are to be instituted in the superior or circuit court of Cook county to compel the city executive to enforce the law providing that dramshops shall be closed on Sunday. For more than two hours the members of the committee discussed the situation, and it was agreed that the league "should strike while the iron is hot."

The deliberations did not reach the subject of possible impeachment proceedings against the mayor, but it was pointed out that any member of the league might go before the grand jury and make complaint against the head of the city government on the charge of non-enforcement of the league.

FINED FOR HIS NOVEL METHODS

Chippewa Falls Man Abused a Horse in Deliverting It to Mortgagor.

CHIPPWEA FALLS, WIS.—C. E. Braster adopted a novel way to deliver mortgaged horse to the mortgagor. He hitched the horse early in the morning behind the barn of Charles Henneman, the mortgagor, and attached a note to the latter: "Henneman: Care for this horse. About 9 o'clock at night, Henneman found the horse and turned it over to the police. A warrant was then sworn out for Braster charging him with abusing a horse and he was brought here and fined. As Henneman does not want the horse, the authorities will sell it to pay the costs in the case."
