

HEMENWAY LOSES HIS YOUNG BRIDE

FERGUS FALLS STIRRED BY HIS MATRIMONIAL CAREER. Fought for His Girl and Carried Her Off to North Dakota Because She Was Too Young to Marry in This State—Given the Cold Shoulder When Threatened with Breach of Promise Suit.

Special to the Journal. Fergus Falls, Minn., Dec. 4.—William Hemenway has left this city after a brief but exciting matrimonial career. He came here from St. Cloud about six weeks ago, expecting to make this his home. He had been here only a day or two when he met Miss Estelle Hight, with whom he had been acquainted in his boyhood. The acquaintance was renewed and a proposal of marriage was made and accepted. It was agreed that the wedding should take place at an early date in November, and Mr. Hemenway was spending the Saturday evening preceding the happy event with his bride-elect when two young men, John Skoosel and Jess Harry, also called. It seems that Mr. Hemenway had been a suitor of Miss Hight, and the intrusion of a successful rival, had induced his friend, Mr. Harry, to accompany him to the wedding for the purpose of pushing Hemenway.

Mr. Hemenway received numerous brides and grooms on Monday morning appeared in justice court and swore out warrants against his assailants. Both were sentenced to pay fines of \$50.00 or to spend sixty days in jail, and Mr. Skoosel spent a part of what might have been his honeymoon behind bars.

Marry, Then Part. This left a clear field, and Mr. Hemenway went immediately to the office of the clerk of court and applied for a marriage license. Application was rejected on account of the extreme youthfulness of the bride—she was only 15—but this did not discourage the happy couple. The next train west bound found them traveling toward the Dakota line. They crossed over into Wahpeton, were married there and lived happily a few days.

Then a cloud appeared on the horizon. The report came from St. Cloud that another Mrs. Hemenway, widow of the bride-groom's brother, had heard rumors of the marriage and was about to bring a suit for \$3,000 for breach of promise, marriage being before leaving for that city.

The youthful bride felt he was not the man she had supposed; an estrangement followed and Mr. Hemenway returned to St. Cloud. He returned a few days ago, but his bride had taken up her residence with her mother; he was denied admittance to her home and she says he has deceived her and that she is done with him for all time to come. He left the city again and the estrangement is probably permanent.
