**GROUP OF HEIRS
AFTER 15 BILLIONS**

**Minnesota Woman and Relatives
to Bring Suit for Vast
Wealth in Gotham.**

Milwaukee, Dec. 4.—Mrs. Oliver Blair of Watertown, Wis., is one of the supposed rightful heirs to property in the heart of New York city, which is valued at \$15,000,000,000. A syndicate of heirs headed by Denver, Col., men and women, is getting ready to file suit for the property, now occupied by Trinity church and the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, among other buildings.

The heirs are the progeny of Hollanders, who came over before the revolutionary war. Police Patrolman George E. Mahlum of Denver is the leader in the movement. The basis for the suit is an ancient sheepskin parchment in possession of Henry Fornbrook, aged 80 years, an inmate of the Milwaukee National home for veterans. The land was granted to the Fornbrooks by Governor Van Twiller, and passed to him, it is said, to Trinity church in 1771. Francis Backus, a Denver cobbler, his brother, and others in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Colorado, Montana, California, Kansas and Nebraska are among the supposed heirs. Mrs. Blair of Watertown says: "I often heard my father speak of the estate and he said we would some day come to our rights. I did not believe there was anything to it. The heirs besides myself are: Mrs. Alice Backus, Denver, Col.; Mrs. Charles Fox, Rushmore, Minn.; Mrs. Elizabeth Tiff, Cyle, Kan.; Mrs. James Shermanhorn, Pickersville, near Watertown; John Fornbrook, Culbertson, Mont.; and William Fornbrook, Pipeville, Wis. Henry Fornbrook is at present not at the estate on a furlough.

**NORTHERN WAVE
ASHORE ON POINT**

**Mutual Line Steamer Will Be
Pounded to Pieces if Struck
by Storm.**

Houghton, Mich., Dec. 4.—The steamer Northern Wave of the Mutual line last night went ashore at Point Abbeve, fifteen miles east of the entry and thirty miles from Houghton. She was unburied and heavily loaded with miscellaneous merchandise for Portage Lake and Duluth. A big hole was punched in her port bow and her forward compartment is full of water.

The crew had no communication with the mainland till twelve hours after the accident. The beach is very rocky and hard to get to by boat. Tugs and lighters have gone from here and are now at work. "Should a storm spring up the boat would be pounded to pieces. The body of Fred Campbell, a ship carpenter lost when the Casadena went down in September, was found yesterday on the beach at the Tamarack waterworks.

RIVAL GRAND OPERA OPENS

**Hammerstein's Company Pleases Big
Audience with "I Puritani."**

New York, Dec. 4.—The opera chosen to initiate the Manhattan operahouse season last night was Bellini's "I Puritani," a work that has not been heard here for more than twenty years.

"I Puritani" was assuredly Italian opera sung and played with all the fervor demanded of such a work. Nearly all the artists were Italian, the orchestra was conducted by an Italian, and the audience, largely Italians, applauded impetuously and hissed characters, as is the custom in Italy.

Bonci, the famous tenor, the singer who has been heralded as Caruso's solitary rival, made his American debut on this occasion, singing Arturo. He was enthusiastically received and was showered with applause.

DARING PROFESSOR BACK

**South Dakotan Who Discovered Rare
Alfalfa Reaches San Francisco.**

San Francisco, Dec. 4.—Professor N. E. Hansen of Brookings, S. D., explorer for the department of agriculture at Washington, has arrived here on the steamer China from a tour of the world in search of rare specimens of plants and trees that would be of value to the farmers of the United States. At the risk of his life he discovered a long-sought species of alfalfa suited to the rigorous climate of the northwest.

SCOTCH GREYS TO MOVE

London, Dec. 4.—War Secretary Haldane, in pursuance of the plan for army reorganization, decided to remove a cavalry regiment, the Scotch Greys, from Scotland. This decision has caused the greatest resentment in Scotland, which was voiced last night at a great meeting of protest held in Edinburgh. Lord Rosebery, in a vigorous speech, declared the time might come when the Scottish nation would be compelled to examine more strictly into the benefits received from the Scotch Greys.

\$100,000 FIRE IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Dec. 4.—Fire in the downtown business district early today caused a loss of \$100,000. The fire started in the store of the Excelsior Clothing company in Notre Dame street and spread to the right, left and rear. Zero weather and the narrowness of the streets hampered the work of the firemen. Estimated sustained losses ranging from \$2,000 to \$115,000.
