STATE INSURANCE GIVEN BODY BLOW

Majority of Wisconsin State Commission Reports Against the Innovation.

Madison, Wis., Dec. 14.—The majority report of the committee appointed by the last state senate to investigate the feasibility of establishing a state life insurance department in Wisconsin has completed its investigation, upon which it has been engaged for two years, and today filed its report with Governor Davidson. The committee is not in favor of having the state go into the life insurance business, because it does not find it feasible at this time. The report is signed by Senators Julius E. Roehr and James A. Fraser, while Senator Jacob Rummel, socialist, whose party is trying to foster several state and municipal ownership projects in the legislature, dissents. The committee has investigated the systems of a number of foreign countries that supply life insurance thru the government, but found nothing to warrant the state's going into the business at present. In New Zealand, which is held up as a model by the advocates of insurance by governments and other public ownership projects, the committee learns that private companies do a greater business than the government. Of the total amount of insurance written 60 per cent is controlled by private companies. This is in spite of the fact that the government issues policies at low rates and that all the profits go back to the policyholders. The senators will report to the senate next month, and it is probable the majority report will be adopted.

JAPS AND AMERICANS NEAR RIOT IN FRISCO

Journal Special Service. San Francisco, Dec. 14.—A small riot occurred today between Japanese and Americans in the heart of the city quarter. It was started by an encounter between Ed Mell, a stable hand, and Tokuhiko, a delivery wagon driver. Mell struck the Jap on the jaw when he refused to move his horse from the entrance to the stable. The encounter drew a crowd of 200 or more Japanese and a score of young Americans. They squared off, ready for a general engagement, when the police arrived upon the scene, placed Mell under arrest, and dispersed the crowd. As Mell was being led away a Japanese called out: "San Francisco will soon be controlled by the Japanese."

PRIEST AND WOMAN DEAD

Woman and Former Housekeeper Asphyxiated in Ledger House. Journal Special Service. New York, Dec. 14.—With a priest's vestments lying across the foot of the bed, a man whom the police believed to be the Rev. Father C. S. Quinn, recently pastor of St. Agnes church at Atlantic Highlands, N. J., and a woman reputed to be Miss M. B. Klyne, formerly a housekeeper of the St. Agnes rectory, were found dead in a room on East Eighteenth street boarding house. Death was due to asphyxiation by gas which flowed from a detached end of a rubber tube that had been used to feed a stove. There was nothing special to indicate there was an attempt at suicide. The police said they thought the tube had become accidentally attached to the stove. No other strange thing had not been an explosion for there was a burning jet only a few inches away from where the gas flowed from the rubber tube. Father Quinn had been in charge of the Catholic church at Atlantic Highlands since last spring, but had been dismissed by the bishop. There had been much talk in the town, coupling the names of the priest and his housekeeper.

FOOLED BY SPOOR OF FIG

Crack Gamesters of Cadott, Wis., Are Handed a Lemon. Chippewa Falls, Wis., Dec. 14.—Not since the famous thirty-day charivari of Professor H. C. Verbeck, two years ago, has there been so much excitement at Cadott as yesterday. It was the day set by the nimrods to rid Cadott and its vicinity of bears and wolves. Charles Kasoureck, who has had twenty years' experience as a hunter, had been chosen leader of the hunt, and Mustard Hardy, a former bronco buster, was the Paul Revere of the day. He roped all the males who could carry guns.

TRAIN KILLS SKATER

Frightful Accident to Merry Party of Young Folks. Moravia, Iowa, Dec. 14.—A Milwaukee train ran into a party of skaters on the Chariton river bridge. Miss Ethel Hoeking of Rathbun, aged 18 years, was instantly killed; Fred Workman, also of Rathbun, sustained a broken leg and a label hernia of Rathbun a broken arm. The accident occurred a few minutes from Rathbun, where all of the young people lived. They had been skating all the evening, and during that sport climbed upon the bridge spanning the river to rest. They were laughing and singing when the train suddenly dashed into them.

The shooting took place at the home of a neighbor.
