## City News

### ROAD AMENDMENT OFFICIALLY LOST

CANVASSING BOARD DECLARES THE OTHERS CARRIED.

Duluth Interests Purpose to Start a Contest and Recount, in Hope of Beating Tax Amendment, and Will Ask the State to Foot the Bill—Official Totals on Ticket.

The state canvassing board today declared the good roads amendment to the constitution lost by 314 votes. The official count showed the amendment received 141,870, the same figure reached by the Journal's count some time ago. The numerous corrections on the total vote cast, made after footings and checking the county returns, make the total vote cast and counted 284,866. The number of votes necessary to pass an amendment was 141,874.

Want State to Pay.

The taxation amendment received 156,051 votes, or 13,867 more than enough. The Duluth interests intend to contest the result, hoping that a recount will show that the road amendment lost and the tax amendment carried. The Duluth real estate board applied to the canvassing board asking it to go behind the returns and have a recount made. The board refused, declaring that it had no power to go behind the official returns. The Duluth interests intend to go into court and get a recount, and then ask the legislature to reimburse them for the expense of it.

Young Makes a Record.

Attorney General Young leads everybody, both in majority and total vote, and has the largest majority ever given a candidate in an off year, in the history of the state. He and State Auditor Iverson ran especially well because of their records and popularity, and were also benefited by having only one opponent. The other republican candidates got smaller pluralities than usual. Schmalz was cut by the Swedish vote. Fred Wheaton's personal popularity cut Pidgeon's majority down, and popular clamor against the railroad commission hurt C. F. Staples.

In 1902, the last off-year election, pluralities on the minor offices were as follows:

Jones, lieutenant governor, 60,005; Hanson, secretary of state, 74,984; Iverson, auditor, 75,284; Block, treasurer, 75,674; Douglas, attorney general, 75,224; Pidgeon, clerk of supreme court, 68,803; Staples, railroad commissioner, 70,937.

Two years ago, with the presidential campaign to bring out the vote, Block and Hanson each got over 100,000 plurality.

Civil service among game wardens is recommended in the annual report of the state game and fish commission, which has been filed with the governor.

The report urges such a law in order that wardens shall not be "removed at the beck and call of some cheap, would-be politician, who wants to make room for some friend who has been more zealous as a politician than the warden."

Big game in the state has increased, says the report, under the protection afforded by the department in enforcing the state law. The gun license provides the revenue, and so places the burden of game protection where it belongs, on the man who hunts. Several other bills have initiated the features of the Minnesota law. A more stringent law is asked to protect the commission in gathering fish fry, against log drives such as that of the Tower Lumber company last spring. A suit for damages against this company is now pending in the supreme court.

The commission wants a car for distributing fish fry, as the present system of shipping them in cans by express is very expensive. In the last year there were distributed 34,635,000 fish fry, 4,654,000 trout, and 809 bass and crappie fingerlings. It also wants a freeproof museum building in which to keep the valuable collection of specimens now on hand.

The financial statement shows distributions during the year \$49,709.35, and a balance on hand Dec. 1 of \$30,403.16. The receipts for the year included the \$85,000 appropriation, and \$233.51 from hunters' licenses and other sources.

## FILLING BASKETS FOR CHRISTMAS CHARITY

The Salvation Army is gathering the good things that are to go into the Christmas baskets, 400 or more of which are to be distributed among the needy poor of Minneapolis. The filling of the baskets begins in the morning and represents no small amount of work, for each basket is to contain, in varying amounts, according to the size of the family receiving it, potatoes, apples, oranges, coffee, sugar, bread, crackers, mince pie, a plump chicken, the Christmas number of the War Cry, and sundry articles of a lowly but cheerful character sent in by people who wish to heap the baskets.

Aside from the aid given the Army workers on the street corners, it pours in by every mail and is offered daily by churches and kind-hearted people in all walks of life. One church has offered to fill twenty baskets, and another will turn over its collection next Sunday.

The names of the poor have been secured by the slum workers from the city poor department, churches, neighbors, and in some cases, from the distressed parties themselves. Each case has been investigated by the relief department and where found deserving of help will be dealt with generously. They are to be distributed from the Army hall at 216 First avenue S. next Monday at 2 p. m., when the holder of a ticket issued by the Army may exchange it for a basket. In this way the hall on the following night the children will gather around a large Christmas tree to receive the presents hung there for them by Miss E. Linn, in charge of the slum work in the city.

## NEWSBOYS PLAY AT DEWEY

Young Hustlers Entertain Crowd with Varied Stunts.

Local amateur footlight aspirants were given a chance to show their ability at the Dewey theater last night after the regular performance. The management has arranged to have an amateur night each Thursday after the regular performance, and last night marked the opening performance.

There were six acts put on and most of them were well done. Four newsboys who have been coached by Collie Nathanson until they are nearly ready to take to the real show life.

There were two prizes offered by the theater management, and Harry Winkler, the crayon artist, was awarded first. Eddie Dillon with his comic songs ranked next to Winkler in the judges' opinion, and he was given second prize.

The show began with a three-round boxing contest between Jack Kaufman and Abe Cohen. Both boys were clever and their fast work pleased the audience.

Harry Winkler was next on the program with his lightning crayon work and the audience encored him several times. Dillon's songs were new and catchy.

## ST. PAUL CARS MUST STOP

Assembly Aims to Help Out Folks Who Want to Ride.

St. Paul assembly last night passed an ordinance making it unlawful for the St. Paul Street Railway company's carmen to run cars past a corner if there are people waiting in a line of not to exceed 50, or imprisonment not to exceed ten days.

There was objection to the ordinance on the part of one member, who pointed out that such a measure would operate against the efforts to establish an express service between St. Paul and Minneapolis, and on the part of another, who saw no use in stopping a car if it was already so full that no passengers could be taken on.

A resolution has passed both branches of the St. Paul common council requiring all St. Paul cars, no matter of what line, to stop for passengers when they

are going in the direction the passenger wishes to go. This is aimed at the practice of conductors refusing to take on passengers when the car is on its way to the barn, and off its own line. Many belated citizens have been obliged to trudge home on foot, while strings of cars passed them, bound for the barn.
