

PETERSBURG CHAMBER WILL HOLD ITS ANNUAL MEETING

President E. C. Kent Will Have Interesting Report of Work Accomplished During Year.

Another Subject of Interest.

Another matter of great interest to the community just now is that of tax revision. This will be given a thorough discussion of Wednesday afternoon at a meeting of the governors, officers and members of the Chamber of Commerce, representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association and citizens generally.

New Move in Church Case.

A new move was made in the Harrison Street (colored) Baptist Church case to-day. Judge Southall, of the Circuit Court, on motion of counsel for the Tartie faction, granted an injunction restraining the anti-Tartie faction from holding any business meetings of the church or electing officers of the church until further orders of the court. It was further ordered

that the defendants be summoned to appear before Judge Southall at 11 o'clock A. M. on Friday, January 22, to show cause why all persons who have joined the church since January 27, 1905, and whose names appear on the church records, shall not be allowed to participate in any business meeting held and in the election of officers, etc.

In his decree, recently entered, Judge West, after patient hearing of the case, removed the Tartie faction from the control and management of the church and its affairs, turned same over to the anti-Tartie faction, at the same time entering an order restraining the former from in any way interfering with the latter in their meetings and conduct of affairs.

Death of Mrs. Ann Wells. Mrs. Missouri Ann Wells, wife of Benjamin S. Wells, died last night at her home on Pearl Street, aged seventy-two years. She was a woman of lovely Christian character and greatly respected. Besides her husband she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Emmett S. Sheffield, and one son, Everett W. Wells, both of this city. A sister and two brothers also survive.

Death of Mrs. Rebecca Tench.

Mrs. Rebecca Frances Tench, widow of Wingfield Tench, died late last night at her home on Little Church Street, Blandford, in her sixty-seventh year. She is survived by three sons and four daughters: Mrs. Hattie Livesey, Mrs. Minnie Woodfin, Misses Estell and Mary Tench, and W. H., L. C. and John A. Tench, all of Petersburg.

Brief News Notes.

The funeral of the late Albert E. Ramey, prominent merchant of Disputanta, who died very suddenly of heart attack last night, will take place from Trinity Church at Disputanta at 9:30 to-morrow morning, and the body will be brought to Petersburg for burial in Blandford Cemetery. Mr. Ramey was fifty-two years old and is survived by his wife.

EUROPEAN WAR EFFECT ON WORLD'S COMMERCE

Figures Indicate Conflict Has Cost United States Aggregate of \$382,821,172. WASHINGTON, January 2.—Figures showing the effects of the European war on the commerce of the world, just issued by the Department of Commerce, indicate that the conflict has cost the United States of \$382,821,172 in decreased exports up to December 1, and has cost the belligerent countries greater sums.

Exports to all countries for the eleven-month period ending with November aggregated \$1,867,991,492, against \$2,250,822,664 for the like period in 1913. Despite this showing, however, the November trade balance in favor of the United States was \$79,411,271 and for the eleven-month period, \$193,372,036.

The November increase showed its greatest gain in the crude and manufactured foodstuffs sent to France, the 1914 total being \$73,049,025, against \$38,787,688 in 1913.
