PROPOSED FOREIGN LOAN IS DENOUNCED BY BRYAN

Gives Out Statement Opposing Financial Aid to Allies—Senator Levels Also Makes Protest.

WASHINGTON, September 16.—The proposed big American loan to the allies was vigorously denounced in a statement given to newspaper correspondents here today by William Jennings Bryan. Mr. Bryan was just leaving the Department of Justice, where he had called to ask Attorney-General Gregory to appoint William H. Thompson Federal district judge for Nebraska.

LOAN WILL INVITE REPETITION OF PANIC

CHICAGO, September 16.—Senator J. Hamilton Lewis today made public a letter he has sent to Secretary Mellon and the Federal Reserve Board protesting against the proposed loan to Great Britain and France. Senator Lewis said his purpose in making the letter public was so that the public could take counsel with the bankers "looking to the proper guardianship of the money of the people." The loan, he said, would invite repetition of the panics of 1873 and 1893.

PRINCE GEORGE COUNTY SCENE OF MUCH ACTIVITY

Improvements Being Made in Territory Between Petersburg and Hopewell Are Amazing.

REPORT NUMEROUS ROBBERIES

Thieves Busy in Cockade City—Elks Will Go to Bedford City to Attend Corner-Stone Laying at National Home.

PETERSBURG, VA., September 16.—Very busy scenes are being witnessed in Prince George County between Petersburg and Hopewell—such as were hardly to be imagined a year ago. The Norfolk and Western Railway Company is laying heavier rails on its City Point branch, is building new sidings and turnouts to facilitate the heavy traffic, is enlarging and increasing the freight yards, and will soon begin the work of double-tracking the road.

Chief England Honored

Chief of Police E. England was the recipient of a handsome purse this evening. The purse was given by the citizens who appreciated the dedication of Chief England of the position offered him several months ago to take charge of the Du Pont Police force and also as a deserved compliment for his services. Chief England has been a member of the police force since 1888, starting his police career as clerk to the late Chief W. K. Eanes.

Adjudged Insane

O. B. Smallwood, colored, arrested several days ago in Washington, and brought here for trial for larceny, and sentenced to a term of six months in jail, was today adjudged insane by a commission, and ordered committed to the Central State Hospital. Smallwood was formerly a cook at the Petersburg Hospital, and while employed there stole a quantity of goods, which were afterward found in his room in this city. He became insane after his arrest, and now appears very wild.

Robberies Reported

W. D. Barker, a white stranger, is under arrest on the charge of being in wrongful possession of and attempting to pass a Du Pont cheque for \$7, made payable and belonging to a laborer employed at the plant. The accused claims to have found the cheque, but the supposition is that he got it wrongfully.

David Mitters, colored, is under arrest on the charge of stealing \$55—four \$10 bills and nine \$5 bills—from the pocket of J. B. Quarles, while walking along the street Mr. Quarles alleges that he was bumped against by the accused, and that soon afterward he discovered that his pocket-book, containing the money, was missing from his hip pocket. The empty pocketbook was subsequently found in a lot near the scene of the robbery.

Walter Coker, colored, is also under arrest on the charge of stealing \$33 from the trunk of William Lundy, at the latter's home. In the Police Court this morning all of these cases were continued for hearing.


