FACES MURDER CHARGE

Young Man Arrested in Danville Will Return to Forest City, N. C., to Answer Murder Charge. [Special to the Times-Dispatch.] DANVILLE, VA., October 5.—Ben Hinsley, charged with the murder of Dave Wilson, at Forest City, N. C., was taken back to Hickory, N. C., to stand trial this morning. Hinsley, who is young, was working with his eighteen-year-old wife in a Schoolfield cotton factory when officers arrested him. He was willing to go back and believes he can prove he killed Wilson in a moment of self-defense. The murder occurred more than a month ago. Hinsley and his wife escaped, came here and obtained employment in the Schoolfield mills, and they were joined by Ralph Brown, who is also charged with being a party to the crime. Brown was arrested a few days ago in North Carolina, and he told the authorities where they could find Hinsley.
